Robert Waite was the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Waite, deceased. He was born in Washington township, Jefferson county, Pa., May 10th, 1835, and would have been 71 years old next month. He was united in marriage to Barbara Me-Connell in Beechwoods about 47 years ago. Unto Mr.-and Mrs. Waite three sons and five daughters were born, two of the daughters died some years ago. The surviving sons and daughters are Rev. John Waite, pastor of the Presoyterian church at Callery Junction, Pa., Rev. James and Alexander Waite, twins, Presbyterian missionaries in China, Mrs. Mattie Himes, of Punx sutawney, Mrs. Barbara Hoffman, of Rimersburg, and Miss Nina Waite, at ome. Deceased is also survived by one sister, Mrs. Thomas Hutchison, of Pancoast.

Robert Waite was a man of noble character, industrious, honest, conscientious, true as steel, a genuine christian. He had been a member of the Methodist Episcopal church for a number of years, was a class leader and school superintendent. ome time he was superintendent of two Sunday schools, Sandy Valley and Par dus, and was always found at his post of duty at both schools, one in forencon and the other in afternoon, every Sunday, and would have to walk four or ive miles each Sunday.

When he neared the gates of death he was not alarmed, he was ready to answer the summons to depart this life. In his last talk with his family Mr. Walte told them he was ready to die and urged them to work earnestly and aithfully for Christ while they live.
