### Attacked by Savage Hog.

The hog is a big one and seemed to be in a most savage mood, it requiring some heavy, well directed blows before it would desist in its attack.

Hammond, who contributed liberally to the banner and a handsome banner was obtained which will be placed on exhibition in the school. The boys who won their 3's and who were stars in their respective positions were Harris, L. Sykes, forwards; Hoffman, center; Thornton and Frank King, guards; Craig King and Blair Sykes subs.
