The cash has been counted, and the notes, collaterals and other securities have been listed. The cash on hand corresponds with the amounts called for by the balance book of the bank at the close of business May 15th, 1907. The notes agree with the amounts recorded in the general ledger as of May 15th. The collaterals and securities called for are all on hand and in negotiable condition. There are no past due or suspended notes, or any notes or assets in litigation.

A trial balance was also taken of the individual ledgers and same found to be in balance with an amount called for in the general ledger.

In our opinion the assets of the bank are of larger actual value than the book value.
