### KILLED BY FLY WHEEL.

Daniel M. Bowlby Met Sudden Death at Old Home Week Days Arranged by the the Tannery Saturday.

Daniel M. Bowlby, an old employe at the Elk Tanning Co. plant in West Reynoldsville, was instantly killed by fly wheel of the engine in the leech house about eight o'clock Saturday morning, August 3rc, 1907. He was alone when caught in fly wheel and it is supposed he was killed a half-hour before his lifeless body was found in a heap on the engine room floor. He had been missed from his work at least a half hour before there was anything known of the horrible accident. There are two guard rails in front of the fly wheel and bow he was caught in the wheel will never be known positively. Mr. Bowlby was liquor runner in the leech house and it was also part of his work to oil the leech house engine, and he may have been working around the engine when he fell into the fly wheel.

Funeral service was held at late home of deceased in West Reynoldsville at 200 p. m. Monday, conducted by Rev. J. C. McEntire, and interment was made in the Reynoldsville cemetery.

Daniel Bowlby was born at Stroudsorg. Monroe Co., Pa., forty-five years ago. He came to Reynoldsville in May, 1883, over twenty four years ago, and began working at the tannery. About fourteen years ago was married to Annie Barry, whom, with three children, survive deceased. Mr. Bowlby was an industrious and hard working man, in fact he stuck so close to his work that it impaired his health to some extent. He had just returned last week from a two weeks' vacation spent at Stroudsburg for benefit of his health and had gone to work Thursday morning.

Mr. Bowlby was a member of the Pro tected Home Circle and carried \$1,000 life insurance in that order. His widow will get the insurance.
