BORO DADS MEET.

Reports Submitted, Ordinance Passed Second Reading—Privileges Granted.

The regular monthly meeting of town council was held at office of Lawyer C. W. Flynn, secretary of Council, on Tuesday evening, 8th inst., with all members present.

Tax Collector Wm. Copping reported \$182.01 of money collected in month of July for 1906 taxes, and \$2,232.33 money collected in same month for 1907 taxes. Chief Burgess Smith M. McCreight reported \$59.75 received during July for fines, licenses, &c.

George Kline was appointed sewer inspector for Reynoldsville borough.

The decoration committee for Old Home Week was given permission to erect stands and arches during week of 18th inst., same to be done under the supervision of the street committee.

Ordinance No. 124 passed on second and final reading.

Bids for paving Swamp Alley were opened, and after being considered were, by resolution, rejected, and the President and Secretary of council were instructed to readvertise for bids.

CRIMINAL COURT THIS WEEK.

One Murder Case—Defendant Pleaded Guilty to Voluntary Manslaughter—Sentence to 12 Years in "Pen."

Criminal Court is being held in Brookville this week. David White, of Eldred township, was appointed foreman of the grand jury, and H. E. Bargerstock, of Bell township, was appointed constable of grand jury. Court tipstaves: G. C. Aaron, of Union township, Wayne Anderson, of Warsaw township, and W. A. Mathers, of Barnett township.

There were fifty-one cases on the criminal list at opening of court, but a number of these cases have been settled.

John Prozinski, who was charged with murder, having killed Pete Bossalo at Adrian last April, plead guilty Monday to voluntary manslaughter and was sentenced by Judge Reed to serve a term of twelve years in the penitentiary.

Analytical Report of Milk Supply.

July 18, 1907, an agent from the State Dairy and Food Bureau came to Reynoldsville and purchased a sample of milk from dairymen and others who supply Reynoldsville people with milk and ice cream and the samples were analyzed by Prof. James Evans, an official report of which is herewith published. It might be well to state that the common standard for milk in this state is three and one-half per cent, while that for cream is sixteen percent. Following is report:

DIED PILING LUMBER

J. I. ANDERSON WORKING ALONE WHEN DEATH CAME.

Faithful Dog Led Neighbor to Dead Master—Mr. Anderson Supposed to have Been Dead a Day Before Found.

J. I. Anderson, father of two of our townsmen, L. S. and Norman W. Anderson, who resided in Knox town, near Knoxdale, was found dead beside a board pile near his barn on Tuesday evening of last week, August 6. Mr. Anderson was staying alone for a few days while his wife was visiting a daughter, therefore it is not known when he died, but it is supposed that he died on Monday. A neighbor saw him piling boards Monday and he was not seen alive after that. Tuesday evening a couple of men stopped at Mr. Anderson's to buy a horse and did not find any one at house and they went out to barn and the dog that generally barked at strangers, did not bark but slowly walked ahead of one of the gentlemen and led him to the board pile, where Mr. Anderson was lying on the ground dead. The funeral service was held Thursday and interment was made in the Presbyterian cemetery at Knoxdale.

Deceased was 74 year old. He is survived by his widow, four sons and five daughters, as follows: Norman W. and L. S.
