Doors Swing Open on Wednesday Night of N at Week, Aug 28.

When the big doors of the Pittsburg Exposition swing open at seven o'clock Wednesday evening, August 28th, the thousands of visitors who are accustomed to visit the Expo on the opening night will witness a myriad of changes. Day and night the hundreds of workmen are kept agoing now to have the \$100,000 worth of improvements completed in time for the reception of the multitudes. Music ball, which visitors have grown accustomed to in years gone by, is a thing of the past. Instead there stands a huge auditorium with elevated floor, of wonderful acoustic properties and capable of seating 3,500 people. 
