## Trustees Sale

Of Valuable Real Estate.

By virtue of an order of the District Court of the United States for the Western District of Pennsylvania in the above stated case, to me directed, there will be exposed to public sale by auction or outcry on the premises first herein-after described, on Main street, Reynolds-ville, Jefferson county, Pa., being the residence of the said James V. Young, on Thursday, the 14th day of November, A. D. 1907, at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, all the following described several pieces or parcels of land, situate in the boroughs of Reynolds-ville and West Reynolds-ville, and the township of Winslow, county of Jefferson and state of Pennsylvania, bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

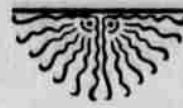
