### IN THE LIMELIGHT

W. G. Buffington, Who Seeks Nomination for County Treasurer.

Among the foremost citizens of Jefferson county who are in the limelight of publicity at the present time preparing for the contest that will be waged in the campaign for nomination for the various county offices at the April primary election, is W. G. Buffington, of this place, who is a candidate for Republican nomination for county treasurer. Being a man who is well known in this county and having been actively identified with Republican party affairs for many years, Mr. Buffington's candidacy has already assumed encouraging proportions and he is being liberally encouraged in his canvass throughout the county.

Mr. Buffington is a native of Rose township and is a member of one of the best known families of Jefferson county. Mr. Buffington has been a staunch Republican all his life and during the past 22 years has taken an active interest in the political affairs of his home district, the county, state and nation.
