### SOLDIERS OF ALL WARS.

May Secure Farms in the Flathead Indian Reservation.

An early announcement of the opening of the Flathead Indian Reservation is expected where the Government following the lottery plan will distribute about 5000 160 acre farms.

The Flathead country, on the Pacific slope region of Western Montana, near the Washington State line, is regarded as one of the richest of the few remaining indian reservations to be given to the public.

Under the statutes, honorably discharged soldiers of the Civil, Spanish and Philippine wars and widows of such soldiers have the privilege of filing upon the government lands by appointing an agent to act for them. This privilege is extended to the soldiers by the Government at the land drawings, where they are permitted to register for the drawing by means of an agent.

Mr. S. M. McCreight has made arrangements whereby he can secure a limited number of agents to register soldiers and soldier's widows, for the Flathead drawing and is now receiving applications at his office at Reynoldsville, Pa.
