The council reserves the right to reject any or all bids. The street committee of the council of said borough is hereby designated to be in charge of said work.

Section 4 The bids to be made shall be for the completed work by the lineal foot, and shall specify the price sub-mitted on each width of curbing, and, also, the bids shall specify and desig-nate those submitted for sandstone and those submitted for cement curb. All bids shall be sealed and filed with the Clerk of council not later than six o'clock p. m., on Tuesday the 7th day of April, 1908.

Section 5. The successful bidder will be required to enter into a contract
