Will Ask Pardon.

An effort is being made to secure a pardon for Carmine Pasuczki, who was convicted of second degree murder in the Court of Oyer and Terminer of Jefferson county at the August session, 1904, and sentenced to fifteen years imprisonment in the Western Penitentiary. Another man was arrested in Italy after the trial of Pasuczki and was tried for the same crime, the Italian court holding that it had jurisdiction over its alien subjects, and evidence adduced upon that trial and confessions of the prisoner then tried, are said to prove conclusively that he is the man who committed the crime for which Pasuczki is suffering.—*Brookville Republican*.
