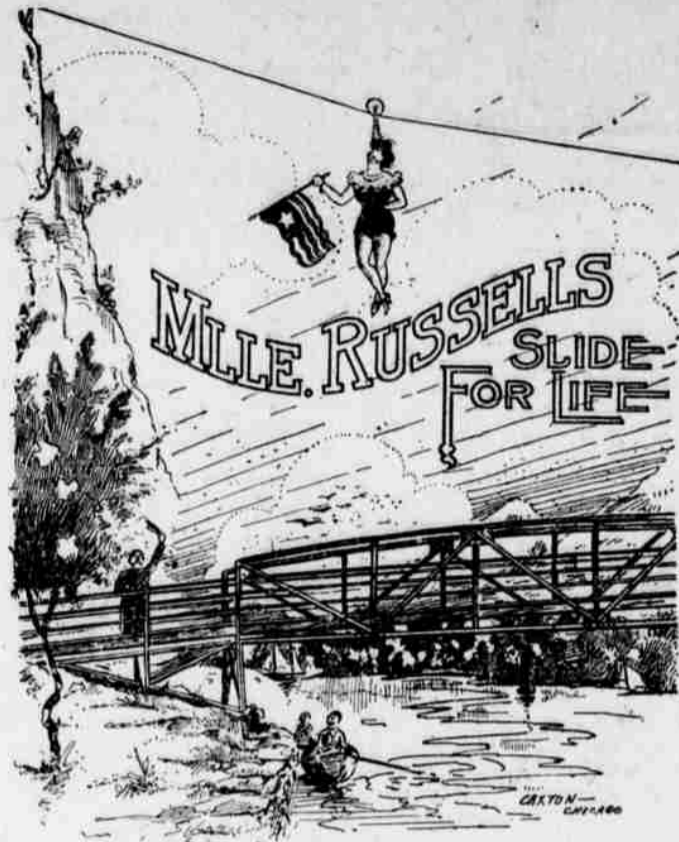

CLIMBING AN ICE SLOPE.

Vain and Perilous Effort to Scale Mount McKinley.

The long trail to the north brings out the best in men and the worst, declares Mr. Robert Dunn in "The Shameless Diary of an Explorer." As a member of a party which made a vain attempt to reach the top of Mount McKinley he tells something of the hardships of one day's travel:

Furtively, imperceptibly, the steepness had stolen a march on us. As one line of footholds gave out we had to slide dexterously to another. The steeper slope was swept clear and hard. Steps had to be cut.

We have only three ice axes. As I never gave them a thought this morning, all of them were gobbled up when we started, and I was left with only one long willow tent pole. It was never meant to balance you in half cut steps that may or may not hold your toe.

As the steps changed from a stairway to a stepladder the other three betrayed no excitement, no uneasiness. Neither did I at first, but I felt both. It was not dizziness, not vertigo, but simply that as I looked down the sheer 2,000 feet from where we clung by our toes imagination resistlessly told over how it would feel, how long it would last, what the climax in sensation would be, were I to fall.

As hour succeeded hour I lived each minute only to make the false step. Courage is only a matter of self control anyway.

Climbing the highest mountain on the continent with a tent pole! Sometimes I boiled in those dizzy, anxious places that I had put myself in such a position with such men. Yet I must reap my own sowing. Once I asked if it wasn't customary to rope on such steep slopes, but no one but Fred answered, and he said: "Y' ain't goin' to ketch me tied up to anybody. A man don't want to take chances with any one but himself, hauln' him down from these places."

One requisite of explorers besides aversion to soap and water is insensitiveness. They can't see; they can't feel. They couldn't do these stunts if they did.

Grant the Hero.

When General Grant was seized with his fatal illness in the autumn of 1884 he appeared before the world in an entirely new character. From being viewed as the stern, uncompromising and conquering military commander, the revelation of his simple resignation in the face of great suffering claimed for him new fame as a hero in another sense. His last battle with the great conqueror destined him for grander laurels than were gained on any of his many triumphant fields. It was the purely human side of his nature that then appealed to the general sympathy of mankind. Thus his last and only surrender was his greatest victory. If it had been otherwise, history would have cheated itself of an example of Christian fortitude the like of which has been seldom recorded.—Dr. G. F. Shradly in Century.

New York Church Choirs.

"Singing in a New York choir has several advantages, one of which is the long contract," said a soprano. "I sang in churches in four different cities before coming here, and everywhere I was hired from month to month. That is the custom in most churches in other towns. The trustees are afraid to sign a year's contract on account of the hot water they will get into if the choir proves unsatisfactory. Congregations in other cities are very finicky and stubborn in the matter of music. They don't take things as easy as the people do here. Notice to Taxables.

Notice is hereby given that the several district assessments of taxes have been made and duplicates of the borough and school taxes for Reynoldsville borough have been delivered to me by the proper authorities for the collection of the same. Therefore, that in accordance with the requirements of the Act of Assembly approved June 25th, 1885, due notice is hereby given to all persons who are desirous, and who shall within sixty days from date of this notice make payment of any taxes charged against them in said duplicates, shall be entitled to a reduction of five per centum from the amount thereof, and any person who shall fail to pay such taxes charged against them within six months from date of this notice shall be charged five per centum additional on all such unpaid taxes. But it is expressly stipulated that positively no rebate or per centum will be allowed on partially paid taxes. That every afternoon and evening of each week during the last two weeks of said sixty days, between the hours of 1.00 p. m. and 9, I will be found at The City Hotel, on Main street, where payment of state and county (or any others) taxes may be made and five per cent saved.

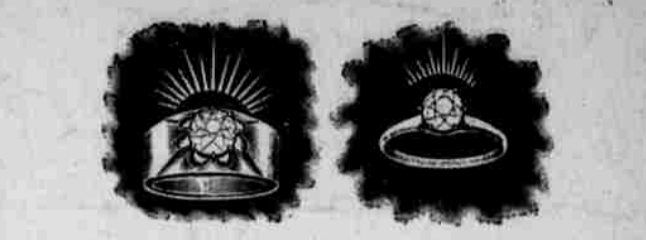
