The writer does not question the right of the school board to engage a foreign architect, only the real principal of such action does not show interest by the school board in the welfare of the town. Such action. practiced by others as well, is one of the real causes of our town being in the state of poverty that it is. If the citizens will take notice, people from other towns do not come here to patronize any business of any description within the limits of our town, but there are always people with loose scruples (or without any at all) who get themselves into positions where discretion should be the better part of valor, but the trust is betrayed for for the sake of some personal advantage they might gain.
