The Tale of a Dollar.

The mail order and sample agent method of buying merchandise is being opposed systematically by the merchants of many towns, and in some instances the board of trade has tackled the problem.

In Bath, New York, the evil has attained such proportions that the Board of Trade is conducting a campaign of education against the practice. Below is reprinted an article which the board has had published, and which it agrees to pay for at so much per line:

"Ten years ago an Allen County, Kan., farmer, put his initials on a dollar bill. The next day he went to the nearest town, spent it with a merchant. Before the year was out he got the dollar back. Four times in six years the dollar came back to him for produce and three times he heard of it in the pockets of his neighbors. The last time he got it back was four years ago. He sent it to a mail order house. He has never seen that dollar since and never will. That dollar bill will never pay any more school or road tax for him, will never build or brighten any homes of the community. He sent it entirely out of the zone of usefulness to himself and to his neighbors when he sent it to the mail order house. The moral is plain."
