RIVAL OF MAMMOTH CAVE

Said to Have Been Discovered in the Adirondack Mountains.

POPULAR SCIENCE

The value of red light in preventing the sufferers being marked by smallpox was scientifically discovered anew a few years ago by Finsen of the violet light rays fame.

The inventor of the roller skate was a Dutchman named Merlin, who came to England in 1760. Eight years later he exhibited a "pair of skates contrived to run on wheels" at a museum in Spring Gardens, London.

Paris is experimenting with what is called steel pavement. It is really a concrete pavement reinforced with a steel framework. The metal part of the pavement is a plate of perforated steel, with strong bolts of steel running through it between the perforations. Each section has some resemblance to a steel harrow, only the prongs project equally on each side and they are square and blunt. It will be superior to asphalt in ultimate economy and to wood in the better footing that it affords to horses.

The elasticity and hardness of rubber are now determined by an apparatus akin to the spherometer, which shows the hardness of steel by the rebound of a pointed steel hammer. A sharp point is forced into the rubber, and the force exerted and the depth of penetration are automatically recorded on graduated circles, a combination of these indications giving the degree of hardness. The elasticity is shown by the height of rebound of a steel ball when dropped upon the rubber from a measured height. The apparatus is simple, and easily and rapidly tests the relative value of different specimens of rubber.

The electric fish of the Nile, of which the Egyptians made pictures thousands of years ago, still inhabit the waters of that river. They are provided with an electrical organ which incloses the whole body. It is situated in the skin, and under a microscope is seen to be composed of millions of beautifully formed little disks, superimposed upon connected rows of minute compartments, in which are the terminals of nerves. The shock is produced by an intense current that traverses the entire organ from the head to the tail of the fish. It stuns small fish. The electro-motive force in a fish eight inches long can attain a maximum of 200 volts. A single giant nerve cell at the head of the spinal column is the source of the impulses.

COUNTRY DRIVE IN RUSSIA.

Speed Proportionate to Price Paid— "Through Village" Roads.

The Russian popular idea of driving horses is to dog them along mile after mile without a moment's breathing space. The speed is proportionate, within limits, to the price paid, but the horses are never at any speed allowed to slacken.

The high road to Ruzza runs in a series of ups and downs like an endless "switchback," yet the "jamsnik" (driver) never once allowed his horses to rush the last of a declivity to carry them up the next rise, but kept the pace steady up hill or down, a regular rate of one verst in five minutes. We insisted several times on giving the poor brutes a few yards at a walk, but at last had to acquiesce in the custom of the country, with the result that at Ruzza it seemed better to take another team for the remaining four miles across country.

The way now lay over what are called "through village" roads. These are simply a tract of Mother Earth bounded on one, sometimes on both sides by a rough ditch, and only otherwise differentiated from the surrounding arable land by the surface being cut up by wheels instead of plows — and the Russian plow hardly cuts a deeper furrow in the fields than wheeled traffic on such a "road."
