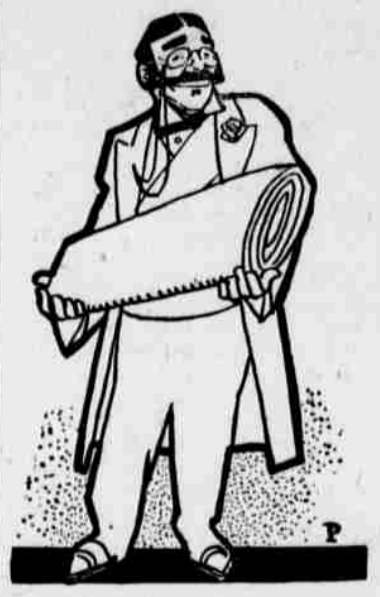

ORDINANCE

West Reynoldsville Borough

AN ORDINANCE granting the Central District & Printing Telegraph Co., its successors, lessees and assigns, the right to construct, operate, maintain, alter, extend and remove a telephone and telegraph system, or either, or parts thereof, in the present and future limits of the Borough of West Reynoldsville, County of Jefferson, Pennsylvania.

Be it ordained and enacted by the Council of the Borough of West Reynoldsville, County of Jefferson and State of Pennsylvania, and it is hereby ordained and enacted by authority of the same.

Section I. That the right be and is hereby granted to The Central District & Printing Telegraph Company, its successors, lessees and assigns, at any time or times, to construct, operate, maintain, alter, extend and remove, in whole or in part, any and all poles, fixtures, wires cables and other devices, now or hereafter in use, deemed necessary by said company, its successors, lessees and assigns, or any of them, over, along, upon and under any and all of the present and future streets, highways and footwalks, lanes and alleys of said municipality, for the purpose of conducting wholly or in part, the following business, to-wit, the telephone and telegraph business, or either, in, outside of and through the present and future limits of said municipality, and to the places of business, houses, buildings and plants of subscribers in and out of said limits.

Section II. That the said The Central District & Printing Telegraph Company shall replace the street, highways, footwalks, lanes and alleys of said Borough, upon which it shall erect any of its poles or fixtures as aforesaid, in as good condition as they were before said poles and fixtures were erected thereon; and further, that the location of said poles shall be made under the direction and supervision of the Street Committee of the Council of the Borough aforesaid.

Section III. That all poles erected under the provisions of this ordinance shall be reasonably straight, planted not less than five (5) feet in the ground, and shall be kept well painted by said Company; and there shall be no cross-arms for the suspension of wires and cables placed at a less distance than twenty (20) feet from the grade of the street, unless by permission of the said council.

Section IV. The said The Central District & Printing Telegraph Company shall be governed by all legal ordinances of a general nature now enforced or that may hereafter be enforced.

Section V. The said company shall within thirty (30) days after the passage and approval of this ordinance, file with the secretary of council its certificate of acceptance of all the terms, conditions and provisions of this ordinance. The said company shall pay the expenses incident to the passage and publication of this ordinance.

Section VI. That any ordinance or part of ordinance conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance be and the same is hereby repealed so far as the same affects this ordinance.

Ordained and enacted into a law this 14th day of June, A. D. 1909.
