used to it now. They never hurt people unless they are very hungry and there is so much to eat around here that no one is afraid of them.

We see all kinds of worshippers here and it is so sad to see some of them. I do so long to reach the girls and boys. There are so many of them around here and they do appeal so to me.

Last Sunday we had about twentyfive in the Sunday school who had never been there before and the same cry we so often bear at home came to me: "No one to teach them." Very often they are very dirty and yet they seem so anxious to get in. I will be one more teacher when I can speak properly. With the folks who came last Sunday, there was a goat and the first thing we saw was Mr. Goat having a gambol right in the center of the church and none of the scholars even smiled. The janitor led it out with no excitement whatever and had to watch so that it did not come in again.

These women and children wear rings in their ears and noses and they also wear anklets and bracelets. Sometimes when you hear them coming you might mistake them for strange sounding sleighbells. The Christians wear few of such things compared with non-Christian.
