### IS NOW AT THE CONFERENCE

Probably the most interest ing sermon preached in a local putpit Sunday evening was delivered by the Rev. John F. Black in the M. E. church.

Taking as a theme the term motto, "Push-Don't Kneek." the minister paid his respects to the individuals who habitually furnish the anvil chorus and "knock" every progressive movement, in language that was scathing and in terms of unmistakable import.

"But of all things, don't be a "knocker," said Rev. Bisck, in closing his address. "In the slege of Ludysmith during the Boer war, a civilian was tried by court martial and imprisoned beccause he discouraged the soldiers who were defending the city. The court

martial did right-AND IT IS A PITY THAT EVERY COMMUNITY CAN-NOT PUT IN PRISON THE MAN OR WOMAN WHO GOES ABOUT KNOCKING. The knocker is a prophot of evil, seeing only the dark side of every cloud. A discourager of the men who in this and every community are defending their beleagured city of Ladysmith against the attacks of commercial or industrial depression. And the "knocker" goes along the picket line offering nothing but discouraging doubts and fears. Pessimistic in his soul, instead of trying to lift some of the burdens of toll, the 'knocker puts on new burdens. Instead of clearing the way for weary feet he puts other obstacles in the path. Instead of casing the pain of the sufferer, he adds to the suffering.

"Don't knock, but push. If you can't push, get out of the way and don't hin-
