## WHITEWASHING THE TRUNKS OF TREES.

The following communication was sent to Prof. H. A. Surface, State Zoologist, Harrisburg, Pa., from Pleasantwood, Pa.: "In the beginning of June, last, I whitewashed the trunks of my peach trees, with good results. Is it advisable to repeat it this fall? When would you start pruning? I would like to have the Bulletins as they are issued. How would you dilute home boiled lime-sulfur solution for spraying the trunks of peach trees?"

The reply was as follows: "It is all right to whitewash the trunks of your trees as often as you wish. You will not hurt them, and it may do some good, but not a great deal. I would start pruning as soon as the leaves are off. Any of the commercial lime-sulfur washes will give you good results, if you do not dilute too much. Some are stronger than others."

"We have changed our Monthly Bulletin to a quarterly, but we are placing your name on our free mailing list to receive these as issued."

"I would use home-boiled wash soon, as for San Jose scale when sprayed on trunks of peach trees, when either dormant or growing, if it be applied to the trunks alone. In other words, I should apply a mixture made by using about fifteen pounds of sulfur and fifteen pounds of lime, boiled together one hour and diluted to fifty gallons. It does not make any difference how much water you take for the boiling."

"If you wish to make your own concentrated solution, you can easily do this by boiling two and one-fourth pounds of sulfur with one pound of lime in each gallon of water, boiling it an hour. Then strain and fill up to make up for the water that boiled away as steam, and store it in a closed vessel, and when you are ready, dilute by adding seven or eight times its bulk of water to each measure of this stored solution. This is really the same as the concentrated lime-sulfur, and you can make it when you have time and store it, and have good results with it. The best plan is to use a hydrometer to test its strength and test it so that when diluted it will be at 1.03 or stronger."

## PENNSY TRYS TO TEACH SCIENTIFIC FARMING

Continuing its efforts to create added interest in scientific farming in the agricultural districts through which it operates, the Pennsylvania Railroad is to carry on an active campaign this winter with its special educational trains, the first of which will be operated on Saturday, November 20th, on what is known as the Bedford Division of the Pennsylvania Railroad.

The Pennsylvania was the first railroad in the East to operate farmers educational trains. In the past three years almost every division of the railroad has been visited, and its boat lines on the Chesapeake Bay have had special educational steamboats on which lectures were delivered.

As announced in the large poster which is being displayed at the stations on the Bedford Division, the representatives of Pennsylvania State College, all experts in agricultural subjects—"are devoting their time and the Pennsylvania Railroad is running the special train for the benefit of the farmers in Pennsylvania. Every farmer should take time to come and hear these practical talks. There is nothing to sell or advertise. Fifty minute talks will be given on the growing of corn, alfalfa, soil fertility, orchard management, use of lime, and increasing dairy profits."

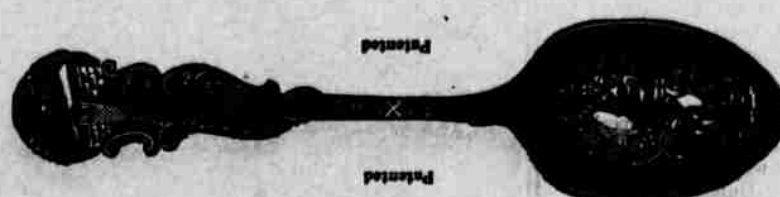
