FELLOW CITIZENS: Remember that on Tuesday next is the most important election, in which you will ever be called upon to participate. The eyes of the people of the whole country, are turned upon Pennsylvania, and if we can show to our brethren in other states, that the Old Keystone State is sure for glorious "Little Mac" in November, it will have a controlling influence throughout the north. The election in this state on Tuesday next will in a very important sense decide the Presidential contest. Every vote will count in its influence. If in adding the votes in the Congressional Districts, it shall appear that the Democracy have a majority, it will give a stimulus to our friends in other states which nothing can overcome: We know there are many who propose to vote our ticket in November, who do not propose to vote at all on Tuesday. This is wrong. A vote now will tell more, even than a vote in November.

Remember the policy of Abraham Lincoln and his party, is as Henry Wilson states it "war and only war," when no living man pretends to be able to see the end of it. The policy of the Democratic party is to seek peace through conciliation—to attempt to appease the passions of the people and to bring them all together again in the spirit of the fathers. Choose ye, war and only war, or peace with all its attendant blessings. As the people decide in the election, so will it be.

GLORIOUS NEWS FROM CONNECTICUT.

The result of the local election in Connecticut shows strong Democratic genius, in all the towns—while the aggregate vote shows a Democratic majority in the state. This indicates that Little Mac will carry two of the New England states—New Hampshire being sure.

The gains in the election in Maine over which our Republican friends crowded so much, it now turns out were on the other side; the official result showing a decided gain for the Democrats.

Delaware has gone Democratic, in the late election by a large majority. Let Pennsylvania but do her duty, and the country will be saved.

KEEP IT BEFORE THE PEOPLE, that Mr. Scofield, Republican candidate for Congress in this District,—is the same Scofield who some years ago, when candidate for the State Assembly gave his promise in writing to the citizens of St. Mary's, to do his utmost to remove the County seat to that place, and at the same time gave his promise in writing to the citizens of Ridgway, to oppose such a removal. This shows the dishonest and unscrupulous character of the man. Voters can you swallow him.

Erson the war commenced we have been called upon to furnish from 500,000 to 1,000,000 men per year. From October 1863 to May last, according to Henry Wilson we had furnished 750,000 men. Since then 500,000 men have been called for this year's service. We cannot estimate on the basis of our past, that less than one million of our men for next year's campaign. If Lincoln is elected that number will be conscripted, and we believe the next Congress will include in the draft all from eighteen to fifty, and will adopt the President's recommendation and abolish substitution. Any one who votes for Lincoln votes for this policy.

The Debt of the Country.

The entire debt of the country, if the war should be ended to-day, will amount to \$4000,000,000. This is equal to the entire debt of Great Britain. But the British Government pay only about 3 per cent interest on their debt, whilst ours averages over 6 per cent. The entire valuation of the real and personal property of the loyal states by the census of 1860, was about \$11000,000,000. The valuation of the property of Great Britain by the census of 1850 was \$15000,000,000.

Thus we shall be called upon to pay an interest double in amount to that paid by Great Britain, while our property amounts to less than one quarter of that of Great Britain. We have always been educated to the belief that the misery of the operatives of England was the result of the terrible taxation to which every thing and every body was subject. Yet our good Abolition friends speak of our debt, as a mere bagatelle one which we can easily wipe out.

The sole issue before the people is whether the war shall be prosecuted until the people of the south, are forced to change their constitution to suit the will of Abraham Lincoln, or whether the war shall be at once settled by conceding to the people of all the states the right of loyal self government, which the constitution guarantees. The issue is war and disunion or peace and union.

Our Convention having neglected to nominate a Coroner, DANIEL D. HYATT, of Fox township, has been placed on the ticket by the County Committee. Daniel has heretofore served as Coroner, and, as a good and faithful officer should do, discharged the duties of the office, to the satisfaction of all. The faithful should be rewarded.

THE LOST FOUND.—We have just learned, before going to press, that Lieut. J. C. Luther, who for sometime past was missing and thought to be dead by his friends, has turned up a prisoner. The news was quite a treat for his aged father and Mother, who had given him up as lost.

GEN. BURNSIDE ON McCLELLAN.

With what a crushing force of rebuke does such testimony as Gen. Burnside's come home to the Lincoln presses of the Tribune stripe, who seek to defame McClellan by impugning both his patriotism and his courage!
