Election Proclamation

WHEREAS in and by the 18th section of the Act of General Assembly of Pennsylvania, passed July 3d, 1839, entitled "An Act relating to the elections of the Commonwealth," it is enjoined on the Sheriff of every county to give notice of such elections to be held and enumerated in such notice what officers are to be elected. In pursuance thereof, I, PHILIP W. HAYS, High Sheriff of the county of Elk, do therefore make known, and give this public notice to the electors of said county of Elk, that a general election will be held in said county on Tuesday, the 11th day of October, 1861, it being the second Tuesday in the month, for the election of the following officers, to-wit:

pointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States, or of the State or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, subordinate officer or agent, who is or shall be employed under the Legislative, Executive or Judiciary department of this State or of the United States, of any incorporated district; and also, that every member of Congress, of the State Legislature and of the select and common Council of any city, or Commissioner of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of exercising at the same time the office of Judge, Inspector or Clerk of an election in this Commonwealth and that no Inspector, Judge or office of any such election, shall be eligible to any office then to be voted for.

And in and by the 4th section of an Act, approved the 15th day of April, 1840, it is enacted, that the 18th section of an Act passed July 24, 1839, entitled an Act relating to the elections in this Commonwealth, shall not be construed as to prevent any military or borough officer from serving as Judge, Inspector or Clerk at any general or special election of this Commonwealth.
