Hon. PHILIP JOHNSON.—A telegram from Washington announces the sudden death, on last Thursday night, of the Hon. Philip Johnson, representative in Congress from the Eleventh district of Pennsylvania. The deceased was born in Warren county, N. J., on the 17th of January, 1818, but removed to Northampton county, in this State, with his father in 1830. He received a good education at Lafayette College, and after graduating spent two years in the South teaching school. Upon his return to Pennsylvania he was admitted to the bar in 1848. Soon after he was elected Clerk of the Court of Sessions, and of the Oyer and Terminer. From this time he entered public life, and was elected to the State Legislature in 1853 and 1854. Three years after (1857) he was chairman of the Democratic State Convention, and in 1860 was the Revenue Commissioner for the Third Judicial district of the State. During the same year he received the nomination for and was elected to Congress from the Eleventh district of Pennsylvania, serving on the Committee on Roads and Canals and on Patents. In 1862 he was re-elected to the Thirty-Eighth Congress, and served on the Committee on Territories. In 1864 he was elected a delegate to the Chicago Convention, and in the same year was re-elected to Congress for the third time. Prior to the election of last year Mr. Johnson declined a re-nomination in consequence of feeble health and Mr. Ven Anken, the member elected, was nominated in his place. The deceased was an able member, belonging to the working class of members, and but rarely indulging in speeches. His death is attributed to congestion of the liver.—Erie Dispatch.

A correspondent of The Lead and Love tells a story of a young Alabama doctor, whom Dr. Yasdell was examining for the position of assistant surgeon in the Confederate army, then lying at Tupelo.
