NEWS OF THE WEEK.

Berlin, May 13.—Eve. It is announced that the King of Prussia will visit Paris during the summer in company with the Emperor of Russia.

Berlin, May 13.—Eve. The funeral of the late American Minister, Governor Wright, took place to-day, and was attended by all the American residents and visitors here, and a large number of citizens.

London, May 13.—Eve. Lord Lyons, formerly Minister to the United States, has been appointed to succeed Earl Cowley as ambassador of Great Britain to Paris.

Augusta, Ga., May 13. As the sexton of the first Baptist Church was lighting up for last evening's service, the entire ceiling fell in with a loud crash, breaking the pews and furniture. Fortunately none of the congregation had assembled and no one was injured.

Cherbourg, May 13. Four iron clads of the French fleet arrived this morning from the Gulf of Mexico.

Washington, May 13. In the Supreme Court at noon the Chief Justice dismissed the Mississippi and Georgia injunction cases on the ground of a want of jurisdiction. The opinion of the court will not therefore come up at the present term on the constitutionality of the reconstruction bill.

Brooklyn, N. Y., May 13. Thomas Healy, Internal Revenue Collector for the first district, was arrested this morning by U. S. Marshal Nolyne, charged with having defrauded the Government to the amount of \$7,313.

Baltimore, May 13.

The special correspondent of the Sun at Havana, says the English West India mail steamer, arrived from Vera Cruz on the 28th, but brought neither papers or letters from Mexico. Vera Cruz was still very closely besieged by the liberals, who were using their only available siege piece with little effect, as only some few houses had been injured and no lives lost.

There was no probability of the Liberals taking the city, unless the Imperial generals should disagree, and thus cause a surrender. Sickness among the besiegers had taken alarming proportions, over two hundred and fifty invalids being in Medellin.

The city of Mexico was invested on the 18th by Gen. Porfirio Diaz. It was the intention of Marquez to defend the city at all hazards. The besieging force is 12,000 and receives additions daily. The fall of the city was considered certain.

Hunger will soon compel the besiegers to capitulate, when another massacre of general officers may be expected.

The accused was brought before Justice Newton, and, after a preliminary examination, was admitted to bail in the sum of \$15,000.

Healy is said to have lost the money in unprofitable speculations. Italy and Belgium have been invited to participate in the Peace Confederation in London.

The Prussian Newspapers complain that France is violating the preliminary understanding with regard to the Luxemburg negotiations, by continuing her armaments.

General Gregg has declared all tribes outside of their reservations in Arizona and Idaho, hostile, and has commenced putting them to the sword with a will.

The American Consul at Lumbaque, Peru, reports the discovery of a silk plant in that neighborhood, which grows wild and yields a fabric finer and stronger than that of the silk worm.

The presence of the Japanese commissioners is said to be for the purpose of obtaining advice, as to the best means of defense against iron clads. Also to settle with Thurlow Weed and his contractors, for vessels which they failed to receive, one only having been sent, and that not up to specifications.

Germany, united as Bismarck proposes, will have 40,000,000 inhabitants.

The great organ for the Mormon temple at Salt Lake, will, it is said, consume 20,000 feet of lumber in its construction.

The bill of Jefferson Davis was \$190,000, not \$10,000 as reported.

The wife of Governor McCormick died suddenly at Prescott, Arizona, April 30th.

Paris, May 13. The President of the Corps Legislatif has officially announced to that body that the peace of Europe will not be disturbed.

Fortress Monroe, May 14. The reception of the intelligence at Norfolk yesterday afternoon of the action of Judge Underwood in bailing Jeff Davis occasioned general congratulations. The newspaper offices were crowded with persons eager to obtain full particulars.

St. Paul, Minn., May 14. Moses A. Hawks, who killed his wife to get the insurance on her life has been indicted for murder in the first degree.

The Luxemburg Peace treaty has been signed but apprehensions of war are still rife throughout Europe. Both France and Prussia continue the most active preparations. The former Government have just sent Commissioners to England for the purchase of cavalry horses. Count Bismarck remarked the other day in a private conversation that he considered war between Prussia and France "inevitable."

The Prince of Wales is now at Paris visiting the great Exposition.
