THE FENIANS.

Dublin, May 25. If the Fenian leaders, Col Burke and Col McClure, who pleaded guilty and thus avowed their treason, are hanged pursuant to law, the authorities expect sudden and sharp reprisals on the part of the members of the Fenian organization here.

The government is anxiously and actively engaged in considering the question.

The counsel who prosecuted for the Crown are guarded night and day by a force of armed policemen, who appear in citizen's dress.

Col. Burke was sentenced to be hanged on Wednesday, the 29th of May. Mr. Doran's sentence has, I believe been commuted.

Should Burke be executed, it is most likely that Col. McClure will share the same fate, as he pleaded guilty, and now lies condemned to undergo the highest penalty of the law.

LONDON, MAY 27.—The question whether the death sentences of the Fenian convicts shall be carried out, engrosses public attention. The press of England and Ireland generally urge that the sentences be commuted to imprisonment for life.

A dispatch from Dublin states that the jury brought in a verdict of guilty against O'Brien, coupled with a recommendation to mercy.

It is said that the American Minister, Mr. Adams, will interpose his "good offices" to save the prisoner McClure from the scaffold.

THE DOG WAR.—One hundred dogs were slaughtered last week, in Philadelphia, by the police, for running unlicensed. We would not like to buy the pudding and sausage sold now in the city of Brotherly Love.
