BURGLARY.—On the night of the 6th inst, the house of Geo. Ed. Weis, in the Borough of St. Mary's, was entered by some person or persons, and a gold watch and some jewelry belonging to Mrs. Weis, and the pocket book of Mr. Weis was stolen. The thieves entered the room where Mr. & Mrs. Weis were sleeping, took Mr. Weis pants and vest out on the side walk, rifled the pockets and left the pocket book and papers which were in it, but minus of any money. The loss is about \$200. The same night the house of B. Weidenbomer of the same place was also entered by some person, but nothing stolen. The thieves were probably frightened off before they could accomplish their designs.

Elk County is getting to metropolitan in more respects than one, but this week the principal excitement appears to be in the line of burglary.—Elsewhere is an account of the entry of Mr. Weis' house at St. Mary's on Tuesday evening, and this morning just as we go to press, we learn that the residence of Albert Willis' Esq., of this village was entered last night, and the same proceedings gone through as at Mr. Weis' We have not learned the amount of Mr. Willis' loss, but fear it large.

This seems to be the same gang who have been following the line of the Rail Road, stopping wherever there seemed a probability of a "good thing." It would afford us pleasure to chronicle the arrest, conviction, and sentence of these fellows, and we hope justice will not long delay.

NORMAL SCHOOL.—Some time ago the Penn'a Legislature passed a law apportioning the several counties of this State into Normal School Districts, each district being entitled to an appropriation of \$15,000 from the State for building purposes. The district in which Elk is, is composed of the counties of Cameron, Clearfield, Elk, Forest, Jefferson, M'Kean and Potter. It will thus be seen that our county is the geographical center of the district, and therefore would be naturally the one to select. Our county contains many eligible sites for an institution of this kind, but we know of none better calculated than right here in Ridgway. Let our citizens take hold and attend to this matter.

Boy Murder in New Haven.

Yesterday an affray occurred in Putnam street between two boys, which resulted in the death of one of them named Matthew Cahill, a son of a woman named Bridget Cahill. The facts are these: The two boys, Thomas Sullivan and Matthew Cahill, both aged about fifteen years, were going home about 9:30 o'clock from St. John's [Catholic] Church, where they had been sent to Sunday School, in Company with several other boys. On the way home Cahill and Sullivan got into a quarrel about something that had transpired a few days before, during which Cahill sprang toward Sullivan to attack him. At the same instant Sullivan raised a good sized one bladed jackknife, and with a desperate thrust drove it into Cahill's breast, the blade passing through the second and third ribs of the left breast, and entering the body about three inches and a half. The blade was one somewhat worn and rather dull, so that a heavy thrust was required. Young Cahill was immediately conveyed to his home close by, but no medical aid could save him, and about 2:30 o'clock he died. Young Sullivan was soon after arrested, and taken to the police office. He exhibited very little concern about the matter when told that Cahill had died. His parents called soon after and talked with him, when he showed more feeling and wept. We saw him at 7 o'clock last evening, when he appeared very calm. He is quite youthful in appearance; with a clear open countenance, indicative of frankness, and impresses one with the idea that he would hardly be the boy that would commit such a deed.—New Haven Journal August 5.

Horrible Death.—Boys Playing with Powder.—Two boys about 14 years of age, in the village of Mexico, Oswego County, N. Y., were dreadfully injured, one fatally, last Saturday, by a powder explosion. They filled the pockets of their pants with powder, went to a by place and commenced trying experiments, to see if it would lift one stone from another by being exploded between them. The consequence was that one was badly burned in the face, and had his clothes set on fire. The other, coming to the rescue, got his clothes ignited, which fired the powder in his pockets, making a terrible explosion, and completely disemboweling him.—He lingered in great agony until next morning, when death came to his relief. He was the son of Dr. Raulston. How came these boys to get possession of so much powder for a plaything?

An Old Man Killed by his Child of Sixteen Years.—A brutal murder case occurred at Peoria, Mahaska County, Iowa, on Tuesday morning, 23d ult. It seems that an old man by the name of Ellis Jones had deeded away all of his property to his son, with the condition that they should support him the rest of his life. On Tuesday morning a quarrel arose between the father and a son, 16 years old, about a most trivial matter. During the altercation the son drew a pistol and shot his father in the left side, inflicting a wound which caused his death in six or eight hours. Public opinion in that neighborhood seems to incline to the belief that the affair was a premeditated one, concocted by the brothers, and that the boy who committed the act was merely made the tool of the older but more cowardly ones.
