A terrible accident occurred at Wayne, Armstrong county, on the Allegheny river, a few days since. Two children of Robert C. HANGED HIMSELF.—We learn that a boy named Simon Feringer—son of Saul Feringer—of Redbank township, about 14 years of age, hanged himself on last Saturday. He was in the barn, in company with a little girl playing, and told her to go out and come in directly and see how he would look. She did so, and found him hanging to a beam with whip lash around his neck and his knees on the straw; and before help could reach him he was strangled to death. The boy doubtless never thought of the result, as he was only playing.

The case of the Commonwealth vs. Jerome and Louisa H. Woodbury, tried at the late term of our court, exhibited details which seemed more applicable to like cases in Chicago or New York. The prosecutor W. S. Woodbury is a man hopelessly blind; the defendant Louisa H. Woodbury is his wife, the other defendant Jerome Woodbury his own brother. The evidence is totally unfit for publication. The trial attracted great attention, the court room being densely crowded during its progress.
