### B. C. RAILROAD EXTENSION

To Patton, Taking Effect Monday, Nov. 25th.

NEW TOWNSHIP ROAD

Between Patton and Thomas' Mills—Work Commenced.

Patton now has the long looked for Beech Creek passenger service which greatly improves the system between Patton and Clearfield, Philipsburg, Williamsport and Philadelphia.

The service went into effect on Monday, November 25th.

Formerly the trains run as far as Mahaffey and returned to Williamsport, while the freight trains run on to this place. Hereafter the morning trains leaving Clearfield will continue on to Patton, arriving at 1:35 p. m. Returning it will leave Patton about 4 p. m., arriving at Clearfield in time to connect with the evening train on the Clearfield and Mahoning road for DuBois and Punxsutawney. Also, connecting with the evening train from DuBois with sleeper attached, and will take the sleeper on to Philadelphia.

By the new arrangement a large number of the Beech Creek's patrons will be accommodated as has long been desired. The trip from DuBois, Carversville, Clearfield and intermediate stations, to Patton can be made in one day, giving about three hours at this place, and a lay-over at Mahaffey of several hours will be avoided.

It is hoped by Patton people that the train which arrives at Mahaffey about 9 p. m. will be extended to this place which no doubt will materialize in the future.

A NEW ROAD

Between Patton and Thomas' Mills—Work Being Pushed Through.

A period of about one year has elapsed since a petition was circulated asking for the building of a new road between Patton borough and Jacob Thomas' mill, and after mature deliberation on the part of the proper authorities the same has been granted much to the gratification of those most greatly interested. Mr. Thomas and Patton parties were the principal promoters of the affair and the necessity which prompted the movement was the shortening of the distance between Patton and Hastings, St. Boniface and St. Lawrence, besides affording access to that section of country in close proximity to Thomas' Mill heretofore unopened for travel.

Work was commenced on the new highway the first of the present month under the supervision of John Nagle, supervisor of Elder township, and is expected to be completed before the beginning of the new year.

One decided advantage aside from the lessening of the distance between Patton and Hastings will be the pleasure of averting the rocky road one mile west of town imperatively necessary during the drive between the two named places and a wave of generosity should flood our hearts for the propagators of the scheme to obliterate the dangers of travel over the "Rocky Road to Dublin."
