

PATTON BORO. ORDINANCES

ORDINANCE NO. 25. An Ordinance to Prevent the Encroachment of Buildings, Walls and Enclosures on the Streets, Alleys and Public Grounds, Establishing Building Lines on the Different Streets and Alleys in the Borough of Patton and Imposing Penalty for the Violation of the Same, etc.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted and ordained by the Burgess and the Town Council of the Borough of Patton and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same: That after the passage of this Ordinance, when any person or persons intend to erect or place any building on any lot of ground in the Borough of Patton, adjoining any Street or Alley, he, she, or they, shall, before commencing the same, ascertain the correct line of said lot and shall not erect said building closer than six feet from the lot line on any of the Streets or Avenues in the Borough, or that may subsequently be laid out as Streets in said Borough of Patton, with the exception of Fifth Avenue, on which Street said building line shall be eight feet from the lot line, and if any person or persons shall fail to comply with the conditions of this Ordinance, he, she or they shall forfeit and pay to the Treasurer for the use of the Borough Fifty Dollars for each encroachment as aforesaid, and it shall be the duty of the Street Commissioner, under direction of the Town Council, complaint having been made to them, to remove any building or buildings or structures as aforesaid, that shall in any manner interfere or encroach on any Street or Avenue in violation of this Ordinance, at the cost and charges of the person or persons who caused the erection of the encroachment, to be recovered by law, as such debts are recoverable.

ORDINANCE NO. 28.

An Ordinance Fixing Grade on Fifth Avenue Between Beech and Magee Avenues, Establishing Grade for Sidewalk on West Side of the Same:

SECTION 1. Be it enacted and ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Patton and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same: That from and after the passage of this Ordinance the Street Grade on Fifth Avenue in the Borough of Patton, between Beech and Magee Avenues, shall be and remain of the same elevation as the present center line of said Street.

Sec. 2. That the Sidewalk on the west side of Fifth Avenue, shall, commencing at north side of Magee Avenue, be of an elevation of 1,748.4 feet, thence north 50 feet to an elevation of 1,754.4 feet, thence continuing north 50 feet to an elevation of 1,760 feet, thence north 50 feet to an elevation of 1,766 feet, thence continuing north 50 feet to an elevation of 1,772 feet, thence continuing north to south side of Beech Avenue, to an elevation of 1,771.4 feet, thereby establishing a uniform grade and adopting the same grade as established by the Chest Creek Land and Improvement company and making the draft prepared by them a part of this Ordinance.

Sec. 3. The Street Commissioner is hereby authorized and empowered to go on the property adjoining and abutting on said Street and take up the Sidewalk as already laid and to grade down to the elevations, or fill up, as the case may be until a uniform grade is made in conformity to Section 2 of this Ordinance.

CRACKERS FOUND ALL OVER.

Wanderers of the Tribe in the West and North as Well as the South. "You'll find crackers in other parts of the country than the south," said the tall, grizzled sea captain like man at the inn. "I've seen them in every land—yes, and on Long Island. I take it the cracker belongs to a class by himself. The crackers, all the way from the foothills of the Alleghenies in Lancaster county, Pa., to the mountains of Georgia, are, as I take it, the descendants of men from the north of Ireland. Some of them reached this state from Canada and went south by way of the old Cherry Valley turnpike into Pennsylvania, and thence into Maryland and Virginia. They are the best of the cracker tribe. They still have some of the religion they started with and a remnant of energy.

"You find a southern or western cracker now and then with a good New England name. There was an early New England emigrant to the south. I met one in the mountains of Missouri, a cracker who was a direct descendant of the old provincial governor of Massachusetts, Endicott. He bore the family name and had a trace of the New Englander in his face, though he could neither read nor write. He had, however, his grandfather's diploma from Harvard college. The grandfather had removed to North Carolina, and part or perhaps all of the family had drifted west and finally reached Missouri. The crackers had a way of traveling along the mountain valleys from state to state, and a good many went into Tennessee and Georgia."

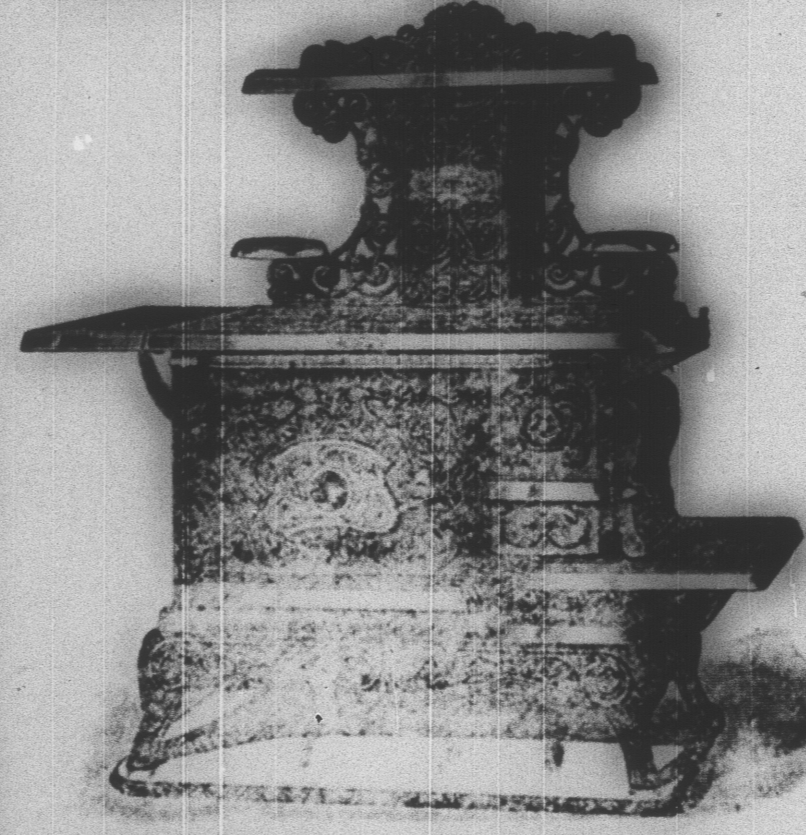
