Anselm McGuire returned home from Lilly Saturday where he has been working.

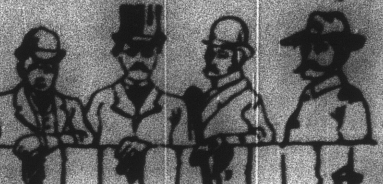
Miss Mary McGuire and brother Anselm visited relatives on the mountains Monday.

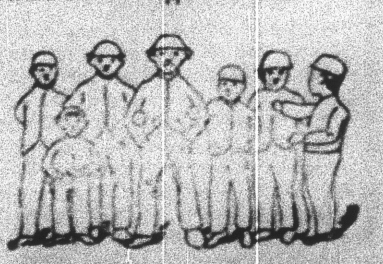
