

BOROUGH ORDINANCE 34

Ordinance authorizing and instructing the Chief Burgess to enter into a contract with The Patton Water Co., its successors or assigns, for a supply of water for fire protection, and prescribing the conditions of the said contract. Be it enacted and ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Patton, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by the authority of the same:

SECTION I. That the Chief Burgess be, and is hereby authorized and instructed to enter into a written contract on behalf of the Borough, with The Patton Water company, its successors or assigns, for a supply of water to the Borough for fire protection for a period of twenty (20) years, upon the following terms and conditions:

First. The said company shall lay water pipes of adequate size on such avenues or streets as may be necessary to place fire hydrants (properly connected with the said water pipes) at the following points, viz: One fire hydrant on Palmer avenue, north of Catholic church; one fire hydrant on Palmer avenue at Seventh avenue; one fire hydrant on Palmer avenue at Eighth avenue; one fire hydrant on High street at intersection of Mellon street; one fire hydrant on Mellon street near store of Jas. Mellon; one fire hydrant on Magee avenue 100 feet west of Swedish church; one fire hydrant on Magee avenue, at Seventh avenue south of W. J. Donnelly & Co.'s saw mill; one fire hydrant on Mellon avenue opposite old Hotel Patton; one fire hydrant on Mellon avenue opposite Centre Block No. 75; one fire hydrant on Mellon avenue opposite Lot No. 6, Block 74; one fire hydrant on Linwood avenue; one fire hydrant on Fourth avenue at McIntyre avenue.

Second. The said company shall furnish at all times a sufficient supply of water through said hydrants for extinguishment of fires. Should other fire hydrants be required hereafter, the said company shall lay the additional pipe upon being notified, and the Borough agreeing to rent at least one fire hydrant for every additional five hundred feet of street extensions, or fractions thereof.

Third. The said company shall not be required to lay pipes in any street or avenue, until such streets are actually dedicated and opened, and the grades thereof established according to law.

Fourth. In the event of the vacation or change of grade of any street or avenue on which the said water company shall have laid its lines of pipe for fire protection, the expense of removal or relaying said pipe, if it becomes necessary to relay or remove the same, shall be paid by the Borough.

Fifth. The said Borough shall pay to the said company, its successors or assigns, the sum of Two Hundred and Forty Dollars per annum for rental and use of the said twelve fire hydrants (that is Twenty Dollars per annum for each fire hydrant). The said rental to be payable monthly, and the rental for each hydrant to commence when the water is turned into hydrant and the hydrant is ready for service, but not before.

Sixth. Whereas the Borough of Patton, by its proper officers, entered into a contract with the Chest Creek Land & Improvement Co., its successors or assigns, March 4th, 1894, for the rental of eleven (11) fire hydrants, then in position; in order that there shall be but one contract with The Patton Water Co., the Borough of Patton hereby embraces within the conditions of this ordinance the rental of the said eleven (11) fire hydrants for the same period as herein specified for the twelve fire hydrants, and upon the passage of this ordinance, and a completion of a contract between the said Borough and said water company, the agreement dated March 4th, 1894, shall become null and void.

Seventh. The said company shall at their own cost repair the streets and alleys of the Borough so far as the said company shall dig up or use the same.

Eighth. The Borough shall afford, through its proper authorities, legal protection for the preservation of the fire hydrants and the property of the company from damage by malicious persons or trespassers.

Ninth. Said Patton Water company shall commence the work of laying pipes and putting in fire hydrants within forty days from the signing of said contract.

Tenth. The pipes so laid and hydrants so placed shall be and always remain property of The Patton Water Co., its successors or assigns, subject to the use aforesaid during the continuance of this contract.

This is to certify that the foregoing ordinance, No 34, was adopted at a meeting of the Burgess and Town Council, of Patton, Pa., October 21, 1896.
