THE BILLS INTRODUCED

By Assemblyman Wm. Reese and H. D. Patterson. When the House met at Harrisburg last Wednesday morning, January 27th, Speaker Boyer announced his committee and printed lists were at once placed on the desks of members.

The leading chairmanships go to the following members: Banks, Stewart, Philadelphia; city passenger railways, Keyser, Philadelphia; congressional apportionment, L. W. Moore, Susquehanna; corporations, Scott, Philadelphia; education, Hammond, Westmoreland; elections, French, Washington; insurance, J. S. Wilson; judiciary general, Kunkle, Dinwiddie; labor and industry, Orme, Schuykill; legislative apportionment, Gilmore, Philadelphia; mines and mining, Mansfield, Beaver; ways and means, Bolles, Philadelphia; railroads, Lytle, Huntingdon.

During the session there were 54 bills read in place, and among them were the two following from Cambria:

Mr. Reese, Cambria—Amending the act of 1887 relating to collateral inheritance taxes so that estates of every kind passing to adopted children shall not be subject to the collateral inheritance tax.

Mr. Patterson, Cambria—To validate conveyance and other instruments which have been defectively acknowledged. Also to provide for keeping the public highways from becoming blocked with snow.
