## Farm Notes.

Feeding the grain and hay to the dairy cows and putting the manure back on the land will increase the fertility of the soil, and in this way furnish feed more cheaply.  
The quince will grow from cuttings, and if given an opportunity to do so will pay as well as any fruit that can be grown. Quinces bring good prices in market, and are seldom affected by overstocked markets, the supply exceeding the demand.  
It is estimated that a steer will produce in three years manure valued at \$100. This sum is one which belongs to the profit, as the manure is as valuable as the cash received for the animal, it being on the farm and ready for the next year's crop.  
Have a place for Paris grass, London purple, corrosive sublimate, and other poisonous substances, and lock them in the location, allowing only one person to carry the key. It is not difficult to get the poisons where they are not wanted, and cause the death of some valuable animal.  
Manure from young animals is less valuable than that from adults, as the demands of the growing animal are greater than when matured. The same applies to cows giving milk, the manure therefrom being less valuable than that from cows which are producing nothing.
