### BICYCLE AND PULPIT.

The Following Worthy Article is Taken From the L. A. W. Bulletin.

The public has little sympathy with hoodlums who stand on street corners and make impolite remarks concerning wheelmen who ride past. It should have less respect for men who pose as gentlemen and who still feel that they have a right to act ungentlemanly toward ladies riding bicycles. And it is even more regrettable when a minister of the Gospel declares that "no lady ever rode a bicycle." It is a bad sentiment to spread abroad in a community. It is a slander that ought to be summarily resented.

A minister of the Gospel should not use the protection which the law and the people throw about him as a means of promulgating ignorance and error. There are unadmirable women riding bicycles. There are some ministers who have done very wrong things. But they are not all villains.

It won't do to "job lot" any class of persons. It is a safer way to think that all persons are good rather than bad.

The ranting preacher is a neighborhood nuisance. What he has only to say should not be preached broadcast into the ears of credulous persons, but rather whispered down the shaft of some deserted coal mine. The newspaper press gives too much attention to what such preachers say. The public wishes the truth pleasantly expounded rather than pontificated error applied with mustard and nutmeg acid.

There are thousands of cheerful, sensible, uplifting ministers in the land whose words are well worth listening to. They are not the ones whose chief delight appears to be found in the pleasant occupation of sending everybody to the eternal bow-wow.

Every reader of these lines knows a goodly number of admirable gentlemen who ride the bicycle. Slander is done the least distressing because it emanates from the pulpit.

Bicycle riding has its evils, moral and physical, which are being intelligently set forth, as well they need be, by thousands of thoughtful divines. But the bicycle is not an invention of the Devil. He never took out a patent on any part of it. The wheel is a hope, a help and a happiness to lots of mighty good folk.

### Bankers Convention at Oresson.

The opening session of the annual meeting of Groups Nos. 4 and 5 of the Bankers' Association of Pennsylvania was held in the parlor of the Mountain house, Oresson, on Saturday. Alvin Evans, Esq., of Ebensburg, made the address of welcome, and he was followed by C. S. Dean, president of the Union Bank of Pittsburgh, whose subject was "Banking Law." Congressman J. D. Hicks, of Altoona, then spoke on "The General Finances of the Country," followed by Mr. Samuel M. Bailey on "Warehouse System and Warehouse Receipt." Mr. T. T. Day, of Pittsburgh, president of the State Association, made a few remarks, and was followed by different members of the association. Friday evening a sumptuous banquet was given at the Mountain house, at which about sixty bankers were present. Saturday afternoon was spent in recreation in and about the mountain resort, and another session of the Groups was held on Monday.

## CURRENCY MESSAGE.

The President Urges that Prompt Action be Taken.

The tariff conference report was discussed in the Senate Saturday from 10 in the morning until 3 o'clock in the afternoon, when it was agreed by a majority of 10 (40 to 30). The closing scene was witnessed by a large assemblage, and the announcement of the result was greeted by a round of applause. Besides the seventy Senators whose votes were recorded for or against the conference report, there were twelve Senators paired and seven who, not being paired, refrained from voting.

### The President's Message.

The following is the President's currency message which was sent to Congress Saturday afternoon:

"TO THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES: In my message convening the Congress in extraordinary session, I called attention to a single subject, that of providing revenue adequate to meet the reasonable and proper expenses of the government. I believed that to be the most pressing subject for settlement then. A bill to provide the necessary revenues for the government has already passed the House of Representatives and Senate and awaits executive action. Another question of very great importance is that of the establishment of our currency and banking system on a better basis, which I commented upon in my inaugural address in the following words:

"Our financial system needs some revision. Our money is all good now, but its value must not further be threatened. It should all be put upon an enduring basis, not subject to easy attack, nor its stability to doubt or dispute. The several forms of our paper money offer, in my judgement, a constant embarrassment to the government and imperil a safe balance in the treasury."

### The Ebensburg Fair.

The Hon. Webster Davis, assistant secretary of the Interior Department, will be in Ebensburg during fair week, and will address the farmers on Granger Day, says the Johnstown Tribune. Mr. Davis was born in Ebensburg, and is a relative of Col. S. W. Davis, prothonotary of Cambria county, and of Daniel James. He will be a guest of the Sons of Veterans of Ebensburg, and address that order during his stay. The fair will be held on August 31st, and September 1st, 2d, and 3d. The prospects are good for a successful exhibition, there is no doubt that it will far exceed any previous fair.

### Ordained a Priest.

At Covington, Ky., to-morrow, Thomas R. Ott will be ordained to the priesthood of the Catholic church. He is a son of Mr. Thomas Ott, of St. Boniface, Cambria county, and will read his first mass in the church at that place on Sunday, August 1st, at 10 o'clock a. m. A large number of clergymen will be present, and a sermon will probably be preached by Rev. Father Benedict, at one time pastor at Carrolltown, but now Abbott at Cullman, Ala.—Johnstown Tribune.

### Carrolltown vs. Patton To-Day.

The "string" Carrolltown club will arrive in Patton to-day (Thursday) and give the Patton "stingers" a chance to redeem themselves. This will be a very interesting contest and all should see it. Game to be called at 5 p. m.

## ORDINANCE NUMBER 40.

Relating to the Erection of a New Sewer on Beech Ave.

## COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Minutes Passed and Other Minor Business Transacted by the Body.

An Ordinance authorizing the construction of a sewer on Beech avenue from an alley to Chest Creek and directing that the cost of constructing the same be assessed to the property owners adjoining said sewer.

Section 1. Be it enacted and ordained by the Burgesses and Town Council of Patton Borough and it is hereby enacted and ordained by the authority of the same, That in pursuance to a petition of a majority of the property owners on Beech avenue there shall be constructed and maintained a public sewer for the disposal of waste water and other sewage matter, beginning at an alley east of C. W. Hodgkins, thence along the south side of Beech avenue to empty into Chest Creek at mouth of Flammigan Run at the railroad bridge on the Flammigan Run Branch of the Cambria & Clearfield R. R.

Section 2. And it is further enacted that said sewer shall be constructed of 12-inch terra cotta pipe at such a depth under ground as to sufficiently drain waste pipes and cellars from both sides of the streets.

Section 3. That the cost of constructing said sewer shall be paid by the property owners adjoining or adjacent to the sewer in proportion to the number of fifty-foot lots so adjacent.

Section 4. That the depth of the sewer shall be located by the Borough Engineers or other competent party and a plan prepared by him and submitted to Council, who shall place the same on file and shall proceed at once to the construction of said sewer, or within ten days from the date of the passage of this Ordinance.

Enacted and ordained the 21st of July A. D. 1897.

Council Proceedings.

Council met in regular session Wednesday evening, July 21, 1897, with the following members present as roll call: President W. C. Hubbard, J. D. Blair, Wm. Leadbetter, D. P. Jones, Ralph Leitch and J. T. Culp. The minutes of regular meeting held June 16 and special meeting held June 21 were read and approved.

On motion of Leadbetter and seconded by Blair, it was unanimously carried that the Borough erect a building for the road machine and Borough tools per specifications to be furnished.

On motion of Culp and seconded by Blair, it was unanimously carried that Ordinance No. 36, relating to the erection of a sewer on East Beech avenue, be passed as read.

On motion of Leadbetter and seconded by Leitch, it was unanimously carried that the following bills be accepted as read and orders be drawn for the same: Patton Water company, \$25.00 for water rent for the month of June; W. A. Mellon, \$4.00 for auditing Borough account; Patton Publishing company, \$12.45 for printing, per bill rendered; Howard Woomer, \$50.00 for police services for month of June; E. Will Greene, \$5.00, clerk services for month of June; Ike Wartell, \$1.25 for badges, per bill rendered; Wm. Armstrong, \$3.00 for special police services on July 24th; and the following per Street Commissioner Jones' account: S. E. Jones, \$13.00; Griff Clearman, 2.85; Wm. Gill, 1.05; Thos. Burbaugh, 50; Geo. Tempo, 3.10; Nick Saver, 45 cents; Geo. Yeager, 35 cents; Wm. Jones, 1.50; Wilbur Jackson, 15 cents; Andy Gibson, 15 cents; Hiram Wilkins, 2.40; Jas. Ingalls, 1.20.

A petition from the property owners of West Beech and Palmer avenues was presented to Council praying for a fire plug at or near the end of the above named avenues. The matter was referred to the members of the Fire and Police Committee, who were instructed to look after the same. Council then adjourned to meet at next regular meeting night, August 4.
