From Notes. An old sheep keeper says that good sheep never lose their wool. Wool is lost through lice, ticks or scab, due to a mite, and none of these beasts can endure fat. Poor sheep are always their feeding ground.

Lime water is considered very good for scours in lambs. Where it is to be used to all sheep a quart of slaked lime is put in a trough and 50 gallons of water put in. When thoroughly mixed the sheep will drink it without hesitation.

Where a farm is within a few hours distance from market the farmer can grow fruit or vegetables as well as staple crops and find ready sale therefor. An acre of land devoted to small fruits will give a larger profit than can be derived from several acres of grain.

This is the month to sow crimson clover. It should be seeded on well-prepared land and brushed in, but it is also broadcasted on corn stubble, or wherever there is a vacant place, so as to have it occupy the ground until spring, when it can then be plowed under as a green manure crop before seed planting begins.

Show us a farmer that keeps his fences up in good shape, the weeds all cut in and around the yard, and the buildings kept in a neat and clean shape, and you will show us a good and successful farmer. Why farmers will tolerate a mud hole to exist along the roadside, or perhaps near the front yard, is very hard to conceive. Such places add disgust to the surroundings.

Houses, barns, fences and yards should be kept neat and tidy. Farmers should take pride in keeping tidy places. They add to the value of the property as well as to the comfort of all.
