USES NEWSPAPERS ONLY.

"How long will you let me run a column of matter through your paper for \$100 or \$500?" as the case may be. I let him do the figuring, and if I think he is not trying to take more than his share I give him the copy. I lay away the profits on a particular line of goods for advertising purposes.
