# MANY VALUABLE RECORDS BURNED.

FIRE IN THE CAPITOL.

A Gas Explosion Wrecks the United States S preme Court Room-Papers Cannot be Replaced-Enormous Damage Done.

The United States Supreme Court room in the capitol at Washington was wrecked last Sunday afternoon Many valuable records were destroyed. The damage which will amount to \$20,000 was caused by a gas explosion

beneath the court room.

The entire central eastern part of the great marble pile from the main floor to the subterranean basement practically is a mass of ruins. The force of the explosion was so heavy that the coping stones of the outer walls, just east of the point where the exposion occurred, were briged out nearly two inches, windows in all that part of the building were blown out ad locked doors were forced from their hinges quite 150 feet from the scene of it. the great marble pile from the main

Fire followed the explosion so quickas to seem practically simultaneous with it. It occurred in a small room tightly enclosed by heavy stone walls in the subterranean basement immedsately belaw the main entrance to the old capitol building. In this room was a 509-light gas meter, which was fed by a four-inch main. The meter itself was wrecked, and the gas pouring from the main caught fire. The flames eriginating from the explosion darted up the shaft of the elevator, which had been completely destroyed by the force of the explosion, and communicated with the record room of the supreme court, the office of the marshal of the Before the flames could be subdued the priceless documents in the record

The library of the supreme court located immediately beneath the supreme court room, was badly damaged by fire, smoke and water; water practically destroying the great collection of law reference books. The library contains about 20,000 voumes, and was used not only by the justices of the supreme court, but by members of congress and lawyers practicing before the supreme court.
