MORE than \$500,000,000 worth of farm products were exported in the seven months ending in January, which is more than in the corresponding months in any year in our history.

THE Massachusetts Legislature has passed a bill providing that after January 1, 1902, wagon and carriage wheels in that state shall have tires not less in width than one and one-half times the diameter of the axle, measuring at the shoulder, and that wagons built with hollow axles shall have tires not less in width than the diameter of the axle measured at the shoulder.

During the past few days several prominent citizens of Patton have been talking about the re-organization of the Patton Board of Trade. Why do you talk about it? All it needs for its some good live business man to put his shoulder to the wheel and publicly call a meeting which we know will be largely attended. As we previously stated, the old Board of Trade has a fund laid by which could be used to a good advantage in looking up some suitable manufacturing concern which may locate here. All it takes is a little hustle by men who know how to hustle. Don't talk but act and right now is the time to act.

PAPER money cannot be safely used in the Philippines. Uncle Sam has recently gained this information and it came near costing him a million dollars. Knowing the prejudice the average American has to carry around a lot of coin, the War Department shipped \$1,000,000 in paper money of small denominations to Manila, to be used in paying off the troops. By good luck it was saved from destruction by the myriad of ants which attacked it where it was stored after its arrival at Manila, and if they had not, at once, been discovered, would have eaten the notes up entirely. The information was got to Washington in time to stop another big shipment of paper money. The troops in the Philippines will hereafter be paid exclusively in gold and silver.

INDICATIONS point to a call for volunteers in the near future, although officials will not admit it. Gen. Otis has asked for more troops and expressed doubts of peaceable surrender of the Filipinos. All the regulars that can possibly be spared are to be sent to him as fast as they can be transported, but they will not increase the total of his army unless his project of persuading the volunteers to re-enlist as organizations, instead of coming home, can be successfully carried out. There is also some anxiety felt over the situation in Cuba. It is known that the Cuban leaders who have persuaded the Cuban soldiers to retain their arms

rather than surrender them and get their quota of the \$3,000,000 now in Havana, awaiting distribution, are not friendly to the U. S. and that they would willingly make trouble, if they dared. There are also mysterious hints of outside influence and money being used in Cuba to foment dissatisfaction. And well-informed men are expressing fear that more troops are likely to be needed in Cuba as well as in the Philippines.

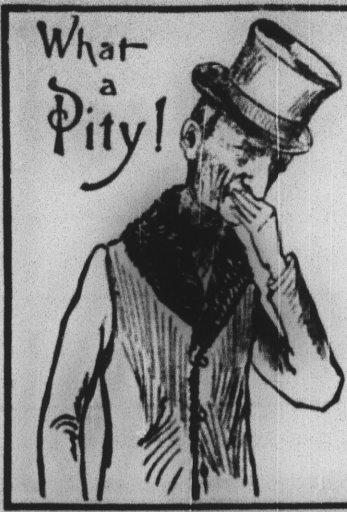
