You ask why there is no money in the newspaper business in Patton? We will try and answer the question. In the first place glance over the advertising columns and you see several of our business men represented therein. There are only half of what there should be for the number of business houses there are in Patton. One will give the excuse, "Oh, wait a while, business is slow, the fall trade has not started yet," another will say, "I have not had time to write an ad, come in and see me next week," and so it goes on and on, one week after another and still you have no "ad" from them. Then again the job work question, everybody knows that there is enough commercial, legal and poster printing in Patton to keep two men busy all the time, and some who work in the town will send their printing away because they save 15 or 20 cents, and often times have to pay extra on the work, making the cost more that they would have to pay at home. Not only one does this mean, contemptible act, but several. Then when they want a "free puff" of course the COURIER can do that, it derives so much capital from the job work. Oh, yes the man who wishes to conduct a newspaper in Patton has a nice time of it.

If the newspaper was to suspend publication for a few months then the business men would find that a town without a printing office and a paper is a back number, and then they might extend a little more patronage for a home industry.

THE POST OFFICE DEPARTMENT has issued a fraud order against L. D. Bass, 3422 Center St. N. W. Washington, D. C., and the so-called agencies conducted by him known as the American Teacher's Agency, and the American Civil Service College, and directed the Postmaster at Washington to return all mail addressed to either, to the writers, after stamping it "fraudulent." Bass has been in trouble before for the same reason. The advertising matter of his alleged Civil Service College, was so worded as to leave the impression that he had a big pull with the Civil Service Commission, which always appointed those recommended by him. Swindling a person under the pretense of securing them positions, is pretty low down in the scale of crime, but it is growing very common. The postal authorities can only act when proof of the swindle is obtained, and the unwillingness of the victims to acknowledge that they have allowed themselves to be robbed makes that difficult and often impossible to obtain. The best preventative of this sort of swindling is the adoption of an iron-clad rule to have no money dealings with concerns which cannot furnish indisputable evidence, -bank of commercial agency reference of responsibility.

THE PRESIDENT'S letter of acceptance now holds the center of the political stage. Opinion differs, of course, to its merits, but it is admitted by his opponents, as well as his supporters that the President has shown that he possesses the courage of his convictions in discussing the important issues of campaign. The letter contains no charges. It assumes the responsibility for what has been done, and argues that the work of the administration has been such as to deserve a continuance in power of the party it represents. The arguments being, from the Republican point of view, are naturally not accepted by the opponents of that party, although no one questions the adroitness with which they are put. In those days, when men form their opinions of politicians from the newspaper accounts of the carrying out of these policies, it is doubtful whether such documents as candidate's letters of acceptance ever change any voter. In fact, they are not written with that expectation; they are written as guides for the writers and speakers of the candidates party-furnishing the party keynotes of the campaign. In this letter Mr. McKinley has done for his party what Mr. Bryan's speeches and letter of acceptance have been doing, and will do for his party workers-furnishing them the information to keep in touch with their leaders.
