One of the sharpest election dodges that has been worked in this state at a borough election was engineered and successfully carried through by the Democratic voters of Brishin in Clearfield county at the recent battle of the ballots.

Brishin, it must be remembered, is overwhelmingly Republican; so much so in fact that never in the history of town has the Democratic ticket been elected. The Republicans put a full ticket in the field. Not so their Democratic brethren. No Democratic caucus was called and when the official ballot was printed it contained but one ticket, and the Republicans thought they had the usual lead pipe cinch. But they reckoned without their host. Assured of an easy victory, the Republicans did not turn out on election day and when the polls closed but thirty-five members of the G. O. P. had exercised the right of franchise. Up to 5:30 o'clock not a single Democrat had put in an appearance.

After that time, however, the antediluvian strolled in and from a list prepared by the leaders wrote the names of their candidates in the blank column on the official ballot. Forty-two votes were cast in this way, with the result that every man who was elected in Brishin is a Democrat.

The fellow who engineered that deal is wasting his sweetness on the desert air in Clearfield county. He ought to succeed Jones as chairman of the Democratic National committee.

REDUCED RATES TO WASHINGTON.

Via Pennsylvania Railroad, Account Inauguration of President McKinley.

On account of the inauguration of President McKinley on March 4, the Pennsylvania Railroad Company will sell excursion tickets from all points on its lines to Washington at rate of one fare for the round trip (minimum rate 70 cents.) County Convention.

The Republican county convention will be held at Elensburg on June 22. At that time the delegates will nominate one candidate for Judge of Cambria county and candidates for the offices of Register and Recorder, Prothonotary, District Attorney and Jury Commissioner. President Judge Barker is mentioned as the only candidate for the Judgeship; C. B. Cover and Charles C. Linton for the Register and Recorder; C. E. Troxell for Prothonotary, and possibly a half dozen attorneys for the office of District Attorney, to succeed M. B. Stephens, of Johnstown.

Ordinance No. 61.

An ordinance assessing a sewage tax on the property owners adjacent to the sewer on East Magee avenue, Patton borough.

Be it enacted and ordained by the burgess and town council of the borough of Patton, and it is hereby enacted and ordained by authority of the same, that, whereas, the several lots of frontage on East Magee avenue, beginning at the property of Harry Cooney and extending to West Creek as ascertained to be 564.33, making a pro rata cost of 54 cents per foot front of all lots located along said line of improvement, it is therefore enacted and ordained that a sewage tax be and is assessed upon the following (being all the property owners adjacent to said street or flow of water to the following amounts, and that the borough auditor be authorized to collect the same according to list and pay the same into the hands of the borough treasurer, to defray the expenses of the construction of the same.

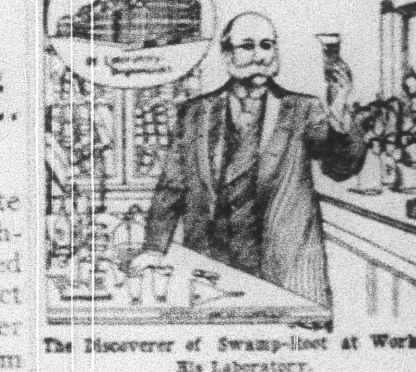
