One of the most of the many fires recently in town occurred on last Saturday morning at 2:30 o'clock when the hotel occupied by John Westover was burned to the ground. The fire started from a defective flue on the third floor and soon spread all over the house before the sleepers were awakened by the heat and narrowly escaped. A few articles on the first and second floors were saved and then the attention of all was turned to the adjoining property which is owned by Mr. Westover. By hard fighting the house was saved, but badly damaged. The loss on the hotel property and contents was total. The building was owned by the Altoona Building and Loan association and was insured for \$1,000. The contents were insured for \$1,000. Mr. Westover is a loser by about \$1,000. He later refused an offer of \$1,500 for his interests. A new piano was burned.
