Prancis A. Storm died at his home in Loretto last Thursday evening at 9 o'clock, of atrophy of the liver, from which he had suffered for some time. He was one of the oldest and best known citizens of this section of Cambria county. He was born in Loretto, Oct. 30, 1837, his parents being Peter Storm and Ann McDonnell Storm. The decessed's great-grand-father settled near Loretto, since which time down the fabian house was open. Mrs. Gewresko described the intruder as being a short, heavy-set man, wearing a black coat, while G. W. Lloyd, a witness at the imquest, testified to meeting such a main along the road some distance away.
