The Fire Laddies Want Permission to Build.

THE COUNCIL MEETING

Held Monday Night and the Business Transacted—Held Issues of at Least Five Thousand Dollars an Absolute Necessity—The New Bridges.

When the borough council adjourned on Monday night every member was present. Prindible, Donnelly, Ardell and Probert were there when the roll was called and Gould and McCormick came in later.

The matter of securing an outlet for Jas. White's property was the first up for discussion. Chairman Lingle, of the street committee, stated that the Hungarian who owned adjoining property would not sell a part of it under any consideration. Mr. Gill offered to dispose of ten feet of his land and it then became a question as to which would be the cheaper—to buy from Gill or open up Harpman avenue. It was decided to give Mr. White the prayed for relief, on motion of Prindible, seconded by Lingle.

Frank Kinkead and Frank Anderson were present as a committee from the Patton Fire Co. They stated that the company wanted to sell the old firemen's hall and put up a better structure in a more convenient place. The hall is owned by the firemen, but they never were given a deed for the ground, which was secured from the Chest Creek Land and Improvement Co. Now that they want to sell they are anxious to secure a deed. The clerk was instructed to write and see if a deed could be secured. It is the intention of the firemen to buy a building considerably more pretentious than the one they now have ground floor would be used for their apparatus and the upstairs opera house or hall.

John Landgren was present sewer complaint, but as the sewer a private one it was not with province of the council to act. McCormick stated that the covance was being violated and urged that it be enforced. Seven posters were ordered printing the ordinance, on motion of McCormick, seconded by Gould. Applications for side walk from John Moran and J. Gould were received and the proposition of new walks, et cetera, discussed. A petition for a sewer by five property owners on the side of Lang avenue was read. Prindible objected to the petition the ground that it was not properly in that it failed to give the name of the proposed sewer. On motion of Lingle, seconded by Gould, it was referred back to the petitioners.

Chairman Donnelly detailed a variation he had with County Commissioners Hosteller and Sheehan in view to new bridges in Patton and motion Gould was appointed to attend the meeting of the commissioners Tuesday to ask for an appropriation of \$5,000. The resignation of W. Weakland as borough tax collector was qualified as soon as his successor qualified, was received and read.

Chairman Prindible, of the finance committee, reported that a lease of at least \$5,000 was needed for the borough in the proper condition and the question will be voted on at the next election.

ELDER TOWNSHIP MURDER!

Foul Crime Committed Near Hastings Sunday.

NO ARRESTS MADE YET

Coroner Mills Held an Inquest and the Jury Rendered a Verdict—Motive Probably Robbery—Suspect Being Watched by the Authorities.

A mysterious murder occurred in Elder Township, near Hastings, on Sunday morning about 2 o'clock with one Miller, of Johnstown, held an inquest, and although the jury brought in a verdict that the man came to his death by a gunshot wound in the great aorta, inflicted by a revolver in the hands of a person unknown, the authorities received and expect to make an arrest soon.

Gewresko and his wife and child were asleep in their room, when the woman awakened her husband and told him there was some one in the house. Gewresko arose and found a man in the room and demanded what he wanted. The intruder began to shoot and soon Gewresko fell with three bullet wounds in his body, also being beaten over the head with a flat iron which was found close by.

The woman and the little girl were so badly frightened they could do nothing, and Mike Fabian and his wife, who lived next door, were the first to offer any assistance. They found all the doors locked, but a window opening toward the Fabian house was open. Mrs. Gewresko described the intruder as being a short, heavy-set man, wearing a black coat, while G. W. Lloyd, a witness at the inquest, testified to meeting such a man along the road some distance away. On the other hand, the Fabians were watching the house, having been aroused by the shots, but failed to see any person leave the house by the open window, the doors being found locked as usual.

This led many people to suspect that Frank Morosky, a boarder in the house, knew more of the affair than he was willing to admit, although his effects were searched without finding anything that would tend to implicate him in the murder of his friend. Drs. Rice and Hager, who performed the autopsy, were called as witnesses. Dr. Rice said all three bullets, which were 32 caliber, took effect. The first one hit Gewresko's lower lip and shattered his lower jaw. The second struck one of the lower ribs and took a downward course through the bowels. The third one, which was fatal, entered the breast just below the breastbone and took a downward course, cutting the great aorta, the large artery leading from the heart, an inch above that organ, causing almost instant death.

The Gewreskos slept with a window in their room open and it is supposed the murderer gained access to the house through this window. Robbery was probably his motive, but when he found he had awakened the occupants of the room he opened fire. The window was the only means of escape he had from the house and it faces the Fabian house and was directly towards Mrs. Fabian as she stood on her porch. She heard the third shot fired, telling her husband that the man had not left the house, and after that time she saw no one come through the window. How the murderer escaped is the mysterious part of the affair and the fact that he was not seen to leave the house leads the officers to suspect Morosky, who did not appear on the scene until after the shooting. He was then partly dressed.
