SUB-DISTRICT CONVENTION.

adopt the report of secretary-treasurer and favor the recommendations.

F. X. YARNER, J. E. FLICK, GEO. LOUKE.

Moved and seconded that the secretary-treasurer proceed to the bank and draw money to pay delegates. Carried.

Moved and seconded that this convention go to record against paying assessed money back unless they are overcharged. Carried.

Moved and seconded that we go on record that all boys under sixteen years of age receive a half turn and that the mine committee and sub-district president attend to it. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the minutes of this convention be placed on record and read at the opening of the next convention. Carried.

Resolved, That where there are ten men working and paying the three per cent check off that they are entitled to have a checkweighman and the rates of wages paid shall be where the output of mine average from what ten or more men may produce up to four hundred gross tons per day \$2.40 for an additional ten cents per day for each one hundred tons per day of additional average output, \$3.00 per day to be the limit and the mines where cutters are paid one hour extra per day checkweighman at mines where there are ten thousand or more net tons on two weeks sheet be paid one day each two weeks for making up said sheets. Motion carried.

Moved and seconded that we refer the resolution to the next convention and voted on by the locals. Amendment, that the resolution be adopted as read. Amendment lost.

Resolved, That all mines in this sub-district where checkweighman are employed that there shall also be elected an assistant checkweighman and mine committee to consist of three members. Should the checkweighman quit then the assistant shall serve the unexpired term and in case the assistant checkweighman or any member of the mine committee leave the mine or refuse to attend to his duty there shall be another assistant checkweighman or mine committeeman elected to fill the vacancy. Carried.

Resolved, That our checkweighman having to weigh coal on two scales for from 70 to 90 men we ask the convention to consider this matter as to advancing his wages. Lost.

Moved and seconded that at mines where there is two scales and where there is machine cutting and loading be left in the hands of incoming officers. Lost.

Amendment, That this resolution be referred back to the locals to be voted on at the next convention. Lost.

Resolution, That where the cutters and scrapers are paid by the ton the checkweighman be paid one hour extra per day and each checkweighman be allowed one day each where there is ten thousand tons of coal, each two weeks. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the resolutions be left in the hands of the incoming officers. Carried.

Moved and seconded that three tellers be elected for the next convention. Carried.

Moved and seconded that the janitor receive two days convention. Carried.

Moved and seconded that this convention present to Mrs. McTaggart \$30.00. Carried.
