





Stars and Stripes Fourth Oldest The national flag that has been longest in use is either the druggest bander of China or the crysantheinum fing of Japan. The former has been used from a very early period, and the latter is as old as the present dynasty in Japan, which is the most ancient in the world. Among Poropean national flags, that of Denmark -a white St. George's cross on a red ground is the most ancient, having been in use since 1219. No other flag has existed without change for anytional emblem, although there are loval standards that are older. The Spanish colors date only from 1785 and the British flag, in its present form, was first flown after the union with Ireland, in 1801. The Stars and trines was drst planned and ordered by Washington of Betsy Ross, an up bolsterer of Philadelphia, and formally adopted on June 14, 1777.

Japa Want a Language.

Carrying Butter Far.

Butter is now packed in a manner that permits of its carriage from Australla to Europe without losing its freshness. A box is formed of six sheets of ordinary window glass, and the edges are senied with gum paper. This box is then inclosed in plaster of paris one-quarter of an inch thick this being again covered with special paper. The plaster is a bad conducor of heat, so the temperature inside the box remains the same. Boxes are now made to hold 200 pounds of but ter, and the cost of packing is 2 denta a pound.
