—Twenty-three of the telegraph operators on the Pittsburg, Middle and Cambria and Clearfield divisions had a dinner at Creson Sunday, the operators from the latter division being the hosts.

—The St. Benedict foot ball team defeated the First High School team of Altoona at Benedict Saturday by a score of 11 to 10. The two elevens will play again at Altoona a week from next Saturday.

—One hundred miners were thrown out of work at Vintondale last week by the closing of the two mines of the Lackawanna Coal & Coke company. As the closing had been foretold many of the miners were prepared and will have little trouble in securing work.

—Rev. Lelferd M. A. Hongrout, of Pittsburg, is the new rector for the Patton Episcopal church and arrived in town Tuesday evening. Mr. Hongrout is an energetic young man with a pleasing personality and will undoubtedly increase the interest and efficiency of the church here.

—There is talk of organizing the Cambria, Clearfield and Centre railroad company and building a line to accommodate coal operators in southern Clearfield and northern Cambria counties. It is the intention to connect it with the New York Central railroad and give the mines a down grade outlet to the eastern market.

—The civil service commission has received a call from the Philippines for 150 male teachers—25 at \$1,200, 70 at \$1,000 and 55 at \$900 per annum. The commission will hold examinations and those who desire to teach in the Philippines will have an opportunity to display their qualifications. The nearest point to Patton at which examinations will be held is Pittsburg.

—William Tyson, of Big Run, the checker champion of central Pennsylvania, played a series of ten games with Archie Henshall at Brown's Hall, Creson, Saturday evening. Tyson clinched his title by winning five of the games, Henshall winning one, the other four being draws. Mr. Henshall is a clerk in the Pennsylvania Coal & Coke company's general offices at Creson and has enjoyed a local reputation as a checker player. It is said many of his fellow-employees backed him quite heavily and are correspondingly gloomy, one man estimating that not far from \$2,000 changed hands on the result.
