—The new Grange National Bank of Patton Monday purchased the Goldstein building at the corner of Fifth and Second avenues at a figure said to be in the neighborhood of \$20,000.

—John Lenhart has at the county seat the present time the largest number of prisoners housed at the institution since he went to office. At the present time there are only 41 prisoners in jail.

—Mrs. John H. Hoover, of Carroll township, and daughter, Miss Myrtle Hoover, of Patton, left Monday for Austin, Texas, for a visit with Mrs. Hoover's brother, Jacob Kuntzman. He will be absent about a month.

—Joe Moore, Joe Wilson and Ed Mohr, catcher, first-base and second-base respectively, on the Osceola team last year, have signed with the Castle base ball team. Adams, stop, has signed with the Steubenville team.

—G. Thomas Bell, sheriff of Blair county and one of the best known citizens of Central Pennsylvania, died at his country home near Altoona Sunday afternoon of cirrhosis of the liver. He had been ailing for the past year and had ended a long seige of suffering. He was born June 10, 1845.

—S. O. Daggett, formerly of the Warville hotel, is now located at Hughesville. Mr. Daggett is an old hotel man and is well known to the traveling public. He is making great improvements in his new place of business and invites all his old friends to call on him.—Williamsport Gazette and Bulletin.

—The statement in the Johnstown papers that the temporary injunction restraining the trolley line from entering Barnesboro was dissolved because the steam and electric railway companies had made an amicable adjustment in the matters at issue is incorrect. —Curtis Kester the 10-year-old boy shot by the deputies at Windber Monday night when the officers opened fire on a crowd which was gathered in front of the lockup died Wednesday afternoon at Windber hospital. This makes the fourth victim of the clash between the officers of the law and the throng clamoring for the release of eight men arrested at the riot.

—Orders were issued from the office of the superintendent of motive power of the Pennsylvania railroad Thursday for the mechanics whose time had been reduced April 2 to 25 hours a week to work 45 hours a week beginning the same day. They will work eight hours a day the first five days and five hours Saturday. About 15,000 men will be affected between Philadelphia and Pittsburg. Before the reduction they had been working 55 hours a week.

—Plans for an orphanage for the Altoona diocese to be built at Cresson have been prepared by architects. The building will be about 150 feet by 150 feet and will consist of three buildings, connected by corridors, the centre one being the administration building, while the one wing will be for girls and the other for boys. Brick and stone will be used in the construction. There will be a chapel, service departments, dormitories, class rooms, etc., and water will be supplied from an artesian well.
