

General Election Proclamation!

God Save the Commonwealth.

Whereas, By an Act of Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act to amend the tenth Section of an Act to regulate the Nomination and Election of Public Officers," etc., within the Commonwealth, approved the 26th day of June, A. D. 1898, it is enjoined upon me to give public notice of said election and to enumerate what officers are to be elected, as well as the places at which said election is to be held, I, SAMUEL LENHART, High Sheriff of the County of Cambria, in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the electors of the County aforesaid that a General election will be held in the said County of Cambria on the

Sixth Day of November A. D. 1906

(The Same Being the Tuesday next following the First Monday of Said Month) at which time Congressional, State and County Officers Will Be Elected as Follows:

One person for member of the House of Representatives of the United States for the 19th Congressional District of Pennsylvania, One person for Governor, One person for Lieutenant Governor, One person for Auditor General, One person for Secretary of Internal Affairs, One person for Member of the General Assembly for the First District of Cambria County composed of the City of Johnstown, Two persons for the General Assembly for the Second District of Cambria County composed of the residue of said County not included in the First District, One person for Sheriff, One person for Jury Commissioner, One person for Director of the Poor and House of Employment.

I hereby give notice that every person, excepting Justice of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the government of the United States or of this state, or of any city, or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer, or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is, or shall be employed under the Legislative, Executive, or Judiciary Department of this State, or of the United States, or of any City or Incorporated District, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the Select or Common Council of any City, or Commissioners of any Incorporated District, is, by law, incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector or clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no Inspector, Judge or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for except that of an election officer.

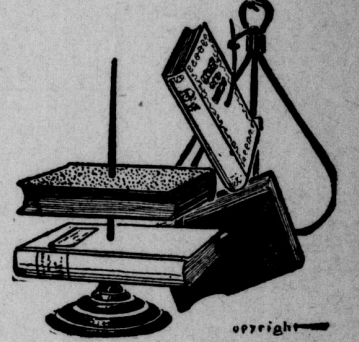
