A Lumberman's Delight

During the late floods W. J. Donnelly, the lumber merchant of West Magee avenue, has been in his glory. He has a large force of men running logs from the woods down Dry run to his saw mill by the aid of what is known as splashes which are produced from several small dams at intervals along the small stream. At times the work becomes very exciting and interesting. 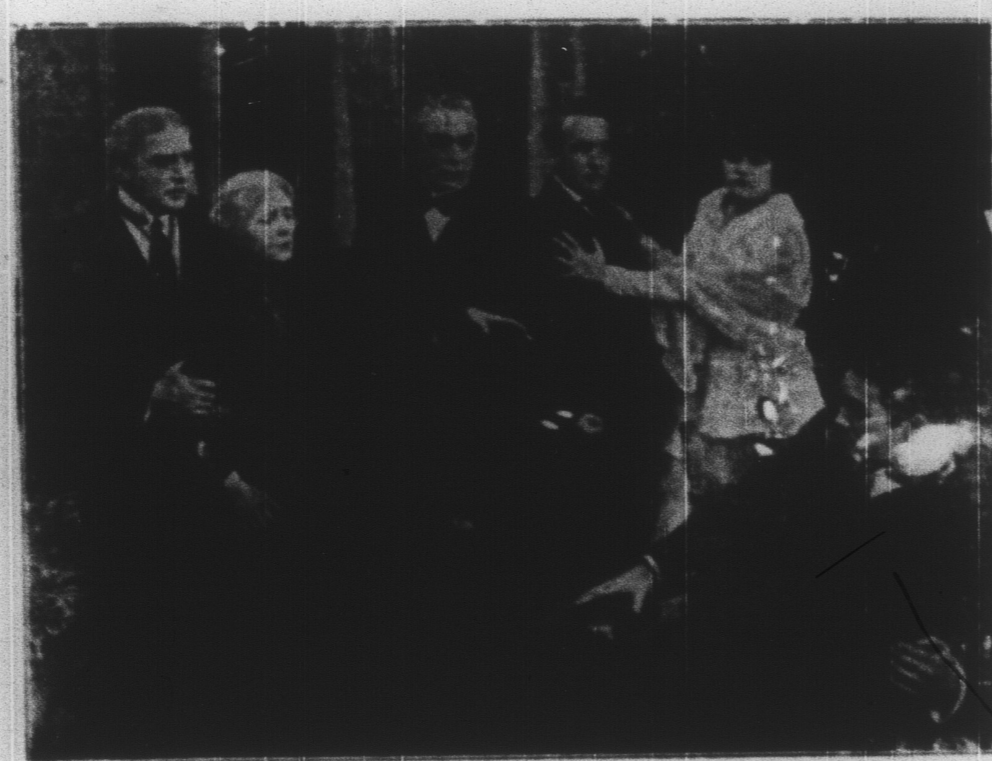
