Former Patton Man Expires at Akron

John Otto, a former resident of this place, died at his late home in Akron, O., last Friday afternoon of diseases incident to advanced age. He had been ill for almost a year with lung and heart trouble. He was aged 71 years.

Mr. Otto was a resident of Patton for 29 years during which time he conducted a grist mill in this town. At one time he owned the entire west end of Patton. About three years ago he sold all his property in town and moved to Akron, O., where he died.

His body was brought to Patton last Monday morning on the Pennsylvania Passenger train and funeral services were held at St. Mary's Church by the Rev. Father Barthold, after services interment was made in Carrolltown.
