

VON MOLTKE DROPS DEAD

LEAD OF GERMAN ARMY DIES IN REICHSTAG

HAD NOTEWORTHY CAREER

Had Been Ill for a Number of Months But His Sudden Taking Off Was Not Locked For—Last of Family

Amsterdam.—Lieutenant General Count Helmuth von Moltke, chief of the supplementary general staff of the army, died of apoplexy during a service of mourning in the Reichstag for the late Field Marshal von deroltz.

Gen. von Moltke was a nephew of the late Field Marshal von Moltke, the great strategist who directed the victorious movements of the German armies when they achieved their me-

orable triumph in the Franco-Prussian war of 1870. At the time of his uncle's death in 1891 he was a major, but in 1899 he was made a general, three years later a lieutenant general, and in 1902 chief of the general staff, in which last named office he has been credited with having perfected the splendid organizations of the German army.

Von Moltke inherited his uncle's estate. His father was chamberlain to the King of Denmark.

RUSS DRIVE HALTED

Germans Take Guns and Prisoners at Kovel Fight.

Berlin.—German troops under General von Linsingen are holding in check the Russians advancing toward Kovel from the southeast. The Russians were repulsed on both sides of the Stry and nearly 3,500 prisoners, one cannon and 10 machine guns were taken by the Germans.

Battles in the Air

Air attacks against military works at Bar Le Duc were repeated. A French biplane was brought down near Lassigny by anti-aircraft guns. In the region of Bezange La Grande, south of Chateau Salins, Lieutenant Wintgens shot down his sixth and Lieutenant Hoendorf his fifth aeroplane.

NOVEL WAR ON BUGS

Electricity Kills Them, but Does Not Hurt Crops.

Washington.—A process has just been developed in the department of agriculture by means of which insects and pests may be killed by electricity. The process consists in the application of salt water to the ground that is to be treated and then causing a current of electricity to be passed through the soil.

This current generates a gas which will instantly kill all the germs, larvae and insect pests in the soil without in any way injuring the vegetation.

Big Oil Well Struck in Kansas.

Augusta, Kansas.—A ten thousand barrel oil well has been struck near here. It is the biggest oil well ever brought in in the Kansas field and indicates one of the largest fields in the country.

Dondon.—Brig. Gen. M. S. Mercer of the Third Canadian division in France, heretofore reported missing, now is unofficially reported killed.

London.—The Spanish steamer Mendib B-Mendi has been sunk, according to a Lloyd's dispatch. The crew was saved.

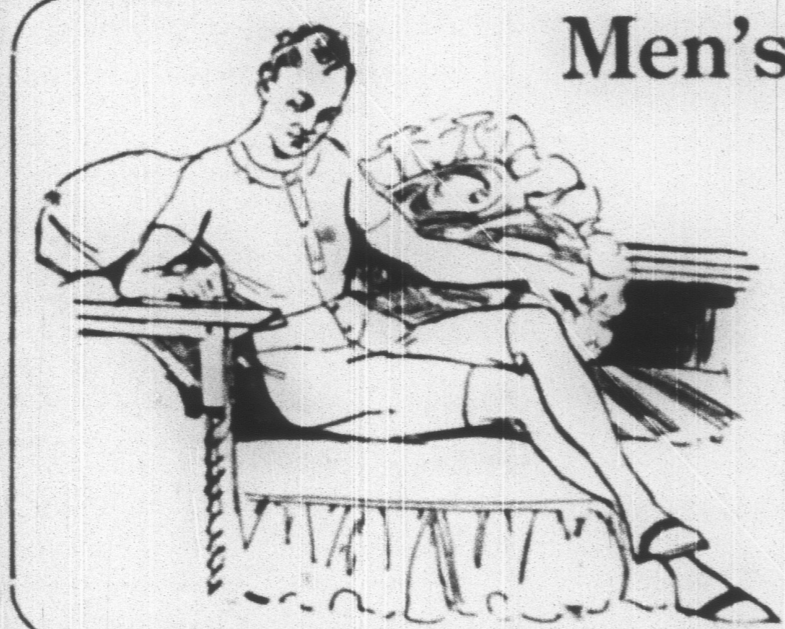

SENATOR BURLEIGH, OF MAINE, IS DEAD

Had Served as Governor and as Representative in Congress.

Augusta, Me.—United States Senator Edwin C. Burleigh died at his residence here.

Acute indigestion was the cause. He was ill only a few hours. His wife died a month ago in Washington.

Mr. Burleigh was state treasurer and served as governor of this state four years, from 1889 to 1893. In 1897 he was elected to congress to fill the vacancy caused by the death
